The aims and purpose of this book

Develop fine motor skills

Your child will improve finger strength and dexterity. This will help your child hold and use a pencil correctly, which is an important skill for more advanced learning.

■ Gaining basic pencil control

If your child can manipulate a pencil or crayon at will, or color firmly with a strong writing pressure, then he or she has acquired basic pencil control. In general, young children usually develop writing skills in the following order:

- 1. Scribbling.
- 2. Coloring an area.
- Coloring an area with strokes going in the same direction.

4. Drawing lines.

5. Writing letters and numbers.

This book aims at developing the first three skills. As children complete the coloring exercises step by step, they will learn to color neatly with crayons and will build a foundation for future writing skills.

■ Nurturing a sense of color

While coloring framed areas or adding more colors to the vibrant pictures, children will experience how different color combinations can create contrast and how the colored areas can join to form various shapes. These fun exercises will enhance your child's sense of color and shape-recognition skills.

How to use this book

- 1. To make the exercises easier for your child, please cut out the illustrated portion of each page for him or her. Please also allow your child to use the backs of the pages to scribble or draw on as he or she pleases.
- 2. This book is designed for use with eight basic crayon colors, but if you do not have the same colors, you can use similar colors or any colors of your choice. If your child's grip is not firm enough, he or she can use

water-based markers instead of crayons.

- **3.** When your child has completed each page, please offer him or her lots of praise.
- Please refer to the "To parents" notes in this book, which provide more comments and advice on how to help your child enjoy and learn from this book.
- **5.** Try to limit the number of pages your child will complete in a day. It is best to end the day's work when your child still wants to do more.

How to use this book



Relax and enjoy!


Kumon's First Steps Workbooks are designed so that children and parents can learn and have fun together. Children learn best from active and participatory parents, so please help your child with the activities in this book. By helping your child, you are encouraging him or her to develop a desire to learn, as well as laying the foundation for your child to become a self-motivated learner.

How to choose the right color crayon

The exercises in this book require eight colors: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, violet (purple), brown, and black. However, your child can use any color crayon that he or she prefers. First and foremost, please help your child experience the fun of coloring. Eventually, your child will be able to choose the correct color.

How to hold a crayon

It is okay for your child to hold the crayon in his or her fist at first, but you should gradually teach your child to hold the crayon correctly.



▲ At first, it is okay to grip the crayon in a fist.

The best way to hold a crayon is to grip the bottom half so that it will not break. In the beginning, do not worry too much about breaking the crayon or teaching your child to hold the crayon properly. Observe your child's progress, and encourage him or her to move forward one step at a time.

How to use this book



How to color

Your child will probably find it difficult to completely color a designated area at first. Young children with a weak grip will find it hard to control a crayon, especially if they have never used a writing tool before.

At first your child will start with simple scribbling exercises. Then your child will practice coloring in a white area. Because each white area is surrounded by color, it will not look too messy if the coloring runs over the edges. It does not matter if your child cannot color the white area neatly—he or she can scribble over the area instead. As your child gets used to drawing with crayons, he or she will naturally learn to draw more firmly and color more neatly.

Have your child scribble to his or her heart's content so that he or she can experience the fun of using a crayon and adding new colors. It may be a good idea to line your table with scrap paper so that you can let your child scribble freely without worrying about getting any marks on the table.

Children will gradually learn to color neatly. Do not be concerned about keeping your child's coloring within the edges at first. It also does not matter if your child cannot thoroughly color the designated area. Give your child ample time to become aware of the edges of the coloring area, and to start trying to color it neatly and thoroughly.

Here is a tip you can give your child: Try coloring from the inside edges of the white space and then slowly move towards the middle.





Your child will practice scribbling first. Even if he or she is using a crayon other than red, allow him or her to proceed. Praise your child when he or she has completed the exercise. Then, say "omelet" aloud while pointing to the word.








Encourage your child to scribble from the tip of the hose. When he or she is finished, offer lots of praise and talk about playing in the water during the hot summer.



Say something like, "Here comes the rain," or "Look, the snails have little umbrellas," while your child is drawing the rain.








Encourage your child to draw using different colors if he or she seems to be able to do so. Do not be concerned about running off the edges.






There's a Snail on My Boots!



When your child is finished, say something about the illustration, such as, "Look, there's a little snail on the yellow boots!" Please also say "rain boots" aloud while pointing to the words.




