

# Conjunctions

are connecting words



like but

or and

or or,

yet



yet, until, unless, and as,



along with for and nor.

At times,  
conjunctions build a bridge



from one phrase to another,  
as in, "I picked some flowers



"  
and gave them to my mother."

Other times,  
conjunctions help  
to link a pair of verbs.



as in,  
"Has anybody seen

op Smelled that dog of Herb's?"

Some will join two sentences,



combining them as one.



Like, "I could not be late to school,  
So I began to run."

Or "When people meet him,



their faces all look sour,

because he can go  
several days

without a bath  
or shower.



Some think a conjunction



shouldn't ever be the word  
that's used to start a sentence.

So that everyone can see




that sometimes a conjunction

Some conjunctions  
work in pairs,  
like this one: either/or.




"We'll either

on a plate




or off the floor."



Both and and can work that way,  
as in this next example:

both my parrot  
and my friend



would sure like one free sample.

Some have more to do with time,

like after  
and before,



When and While,  
until and Since,



to name a handful more.

"*After* playtime, we'll clean up."

"While I slept,  
she'd holler."



See how these refer to "when"?

Like, "Since last  
May, I'm taller."

Some conjunctions *join*



what doesn't seem  
to go together.

As in, "My dad loves Tampa,



even though he hates the Weather."

Or "Mom's a ballroom dancing champ  
although she's quite a klutz."




Yes, all these are
