Articles

An article is a type of adjective that tells if a noun is a general or a specific thing.

Examples: a, an, the

Conjunctions

A conjunction is a word that joins two words or two phrases together.

Examples: and, but, or

Verbs

A verb is a word that shows action or state of being.

Examples: run, jump, fall

Adverbs

An adverb describes a verb or an adjective.

A noun can be a person, a place, a thing, or an idea.

Examples: book, school, love



Put parentheses around the adjective prepositional phrase in each sentence. Then, write the number of the sentence next to the picture it represents.


