







This is North Africa, in the afternoon. The sun is hot. Very hot.


Mansour comes to sell watermelons. He sees a beautiful girl. A beautiful girl with big brown eyes.

Marissa's father smiles.


'Come back when you have five hundred,' he says. 'Then you can marry Marissa.'

So he walks to his uncle's house.





His uncle's house does not look good. Everything is old. Everything is broken.


Mansour sees his uncle's white donkey. It is thin and sad.

'Are you hungry?'









Mansour makes some tea, and his uncle smiles.





'Oh dear,' says the old man sadly.

'Are you thirsty?' says Mansour.


He gives the donkey some water,

scratches the ground again.


'Are you telling me something?' asks Mansour.

He finds a box! A box full of money. His uncle's money.




