



Baby seal bonanza.

Here's some **seal-y** good news – **138 harbour seal pups** have been born on the banks of the **River Thames**! The babies were spotted during the first ever count of seal pups by the **Zoological Society of London** (ZSL) and is extra impressive, seeing as the Thames was declared **'biologically dead'** in the 1950s.

The booming numbers of both harbour and grey seals suggests there's plenty of food for them to gobble and that the river's ecosystem is healthy! Scientists say the Thames is home to more than 100 species of fish, including seahorses and sharks!





Shocking news. A new species of **electric eel** has been discovered in the Amazon

basin – and it's a record breaker! The giant fish, named Electrophorus voltai, can produce a massive jolt of 860 volts - that's 210 volts more than other electric eels! It uses its shock tactics to hunt, for self-defence and to navigate.


Experts think the eel's extra power evolved because the highland waters it inhabits conduct less electricity. Previously there was thought to be just one type of electric eel, but the researchers uncovered another species, too, taking the total to **three**! Who knows what else might be lurking in the Amazon!



Giant Kite Festival

In parts of **Guatemala**, a country in Central America, traditional Day of the Dead celebrations have the addition of colossal kites! For the past 3,000 years, barriletes gigantes ('giant kites') have been crafted as a way to honour the dead. The colourful circles soar above cemeteries while local people decorate their ancestors' graves with flowers and eat picnics below. According to legend, the kites help people communicate with their long-lost loved ones, and keep away evil spirits. Each hand-painted kite can take up to 40 days to make out of bamboo frames, paper and cloth.

Later, the kites are judged on their beauty and how long they can stay in the air – but because some are up to 36m across, it often isn't long!








FANTASTIC ANIMALS!

amazing – he moved Allen into a safe position, covered him with a blanket and barked for help. What a hero!


HOOVER - THE TALKING SEAL








sound strange, but some special grey wolves have been living by the seaside for thousands of years. Known as coastal wolves, more than 2,000 of these canines live among the islands and coastal rainforest of western British Columbia in Canada, stretching up into southeast Alaska (see map, bottom right). "Their environment is very different from that of any other wolf," says wildlife researcher Chris Darimont. "So they've had to adapt to this unique place." Check out five ways these howlers are living their best life on the beach...





BEACH HAIR, DON'T CARE

You might expect coastal grey wolves to be, well, grey like most grey wolves. But coastal wolves' fur is often streaked with reddish-orange highlights, a shade similar to a common seaweed on the shore.

"The colour matches almost perfectly," Chris says.

"It's thought the colouring helps camouflage these predators while they're searching for prey on the beach."

Coastal wolves also have less underfur than other grey wolves. This cottony fluff helps wolves living in **snowy** places keep warm, like the stuffing in a winter jacket. But coastal wolves' habitat is so mild they don't need the extra layer. You probably wouldn't want to wear a winter **coat** on the **beach**, either!

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PACK LIFE


Coastal wolves might have a **different way of life** because of their **beach habitat**, but they socialise just like other grey wolves do – in a **pack**. "Packs are really just **families**," Chris explains. "They have a mum, a dad and lots of siblings."

All the **siblings** help the **alphas** (the mum and dad) to raise their young pups. One **older sibling** typically stays behind to watch over the **playful pups** while the rest of the family is out **hunting**. Once the young wolves are old enough – about **two years old** – they might strike out on their own or stick around with their family to help raise new youngsters.

SWIMMING CHAMPS

One small island usually isn't big enough for coastal wolves to find and eat the 3kg of food they need each day. So the canines doggypaddle from island to island in search of more food. And these wolves really are super swimmers. "Scientists have spotted them on nearly every one of the thousand islands and rocky outcrops in the area," says conservationist lan McAllister. "They've been known to swim up to 12km in between each strip of land."









Unlike their forest-dwelling relatives, who devour moose, elk or caribou, coastal wolves comb the beach, using their powerful sense of smell to find whatever snacks the ocean has served up. They might dig in the sand for crabs and clams, feast on fish eggs stuck to kelp, or sneak up on sunbathing seals or otters. "They'll even scoff barnacles off logs as if they're corn on the cob!" says Chris.

Others just chow down on salmon. "They wait in the shallows where the salmons' backsides are poking out, then snap up the tastiest-looking fish they can find," Chris explains. "A coastal wolf might gobble up ten salmon in just one morning!"

HOWL-OWEEN

Ahhhh-wooooh! Around Halloween, that sound might send shivers down your spine. But why?

Wolves are the top **predators** in many habitats. For thousands of years people competed with the canines for food and protected their livestock from them. In almost all cultures where ancient people lived near wolves, these carnivores inspired frightening folktales about humans turning into scary bloodthirsty beasts - werewolves!

In parts of the world with different animals at the top of the food chain, people created stories about creatures such as were-tigers, were-jaguars, and were-crocodiles. If you ask us, they all sound like they'd make howlingly good Halloween costumes!



SPLASHY **SURPRISE**

Grey wolves that live in open habitats often hunt by chasing big, hoofed animals across a wide plain. But that style of **hunting** doesn't work on a coast that's full of **thick** rainforest or tiny islands too small to run across. Instead, coastal wolves often sneak up on prey – then pounce! Seals might be able to get away from killer whales by clambering onto rocks or beaches. But on land they're not **safe** from ambushing wolves.




Think a wolf by the ocean is strange? Meet a few other animals that might seem out of place but are right where they're supposed to be...

TREE GOATS

These goats will do a lot for a snack - including climbing to the top of a 9-m-tall tree! **Every summer** the argan trees in southwest Morocco produce bittertasting fruit that the local goats can't resist. And these peckish goats are doing us humans a favour - when they spit (or sometimes poo!) out the indigestible nut inside the argan fruit, the nuts can be collected to make an oil that's used in hair products

and **food!**










VOLCANO SHARKS When scientists dropped a **deep-sea camera** into the mouth of an active **underwater volcano** in the **South Pacific Ocean** near the **Solomon Islands**, they were surprised to discover **three species of sharks** swimming through water that's **too hot** and **acidic** for human divers – **scalloped hammerheads**, **silky sharks** and a super-rare **Pacific sleeper shark**. The big question now is whether the sharks will able to sense when the volcano will **erupt** again!

CITY WHALES

No, they're not visiting the Empire State Building - they're on the lookout for food! Humpback whales are swimming back in the waters off the coast of New York City in the USA. Why? Years of cleanup efforts in the Hudson River - a tidal estuary where fresh and salt water meet - have brought back algae, zooplankton and fish. And the humpbacks, which are the ultimate foodie tourists, weren't far behind! So far this year there have been an incredible 377 sightings. Wow!





FOREST PENGUINS

Fiordland crested penguins prefer the warm waters and misty rainforest of southwest New Zealand to the icy Antarctic! With smaller bodies than many cold-weather penguins (such as emperors), the flightless birds live in balmy 21°C temperatures. And their eggs stay toasty in this warmer habitat, too, tucked away in caves, bushes and tree stumps where males sit on the nests.

OCEAN SLOTHS

Pygmy three-toed sloths might be slow climbers, but when they get into the water, they're powerful paddlers! These special sloths, which only live in the mangroves of a tiny island off the coast of **Panama** in Central America, plop into the sea when they want to move to a new tree. Their tummies are often filled with gas due to their leafy diet, so they stay afloat easily and they can move three times faster in the water than they can on the ground. But since we're talking about sloths, that's not really saying much!





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KING TUT'S TREASURES!

It's almost 100 years since 'Boy King' Tutankhamun's tomb was discovered. Now's your last chance to see its treasures before they're returned to Egypt...

Ing Tutankhamun became ruler of Ancient Egypt when he was nine years old. The Boy King died just ten years later and he was buried in a golden coffin surrounded by 5,000 priceless treasures, including animal statues, jewellery, clothes, weapons and even toys.

Tut's tomb was found by British archaeologist Howard
Carter in November 1922, more than 3,300 years after the
Egyptian Pharaoh's death. Remarkably, it was almost
untouched. Now, to celebrate the anniversary of the incredible
tomb's discovery, 150 artefacts from the burial site are on display
at the Saatchi Gallery in London, more than 60 of which have
never been seen outside of Egypt. Check out three of them here...

This life-sized statue of
Tutankhamun, with piercing golden eyes,
gold clothing and contrasting black skin, was
one of two sentries that Howard Carter found
guarding the sealed entrance of Tut's burial
chamber. Would you have dared mess with it?!

Miniature Canopic Coffin The afterlife was incredibly important to the Ancient Egyptians. They believed that by preserving a dead person's body - through the process of mummification - the soul would live on in the afterlife forever. During the mummification process, the internal organs were removed, wrapped in linen bandages and placed in containers called canopic vessels. Usually these were jars, but sometimes the organs were stored in miniature golden coffins. This beautiful coffin (left) contained King Tut's liver. Wow!

Gilded Wooden Bed
Experts think the gold-covered bed (below) was made for King
Tut's funeral. The Ancient Egyptians believed that the dead were
merely asleep and that they woke up when they were 'reborn' in the
afterlife. To ensure the Pharaoh's safe passage into the afterlife and to
keep evil forces at bay, divine figures were carved on to the bed – in
this case Bes, a god who frightened away evil
spirits from newborn babies, and Tauret, the
hippo goddess. Sweet dreams!

SCIENCE SCIENCE HOW CREEPY THINGS AFFECT YOUR BRAIN... What's that strange noise in the night? Is it the wind? Or something else? "When you encounter something scary, your brain releases chemicals," says psychologist Martin Antony. "These chemicals make our hearts race, so we breathe faster and sweat. Your nervous

system is preparing your body to either fight a threat or run away from it." Scientists call this the 'fight-or-flight' response. So which so-called spooky things make us feel this way - and why? Discover what puts the eek! in these five fr-eek-y phobias...

THE FEAR: SPIDERS

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Arachnophobia

SPOOKY SCIENCE: Some scientists believe that venomous spiders were so dangerous to ancient humans that a fear of the species became part of our **DNA!** Other experts think that it's the arachnids' angular legs, dark colours and unpredictable movements that makes them scary. "A lot of people still have incorrect ideas about how dangerous spiders are," says psychologist Kyle Rexer. "While some spiders can be deadly, most are not."

In fact, humans actually benefit from the existence of spiders. By eating diseasecarrying critters such as mosquitoes and cockroaches, these arachnids act as a form of pest control. Plus, scientists are currently studying spider venom in the hopes that it can one day be used in medicines to manage pain or cure illnesses.


THE FEAR: CLOWNS

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Coulrophobia

SPOOKY SCIENCE: One way we decide if a person is friend or foe is by evaluating their facial expressions. Clowns – with their makeup, wigs and fake noses - are hard to read, which is part of what makes them scary to some people. "It's hard to tell how a clown is feeling," psychology professor Frank McAndrew says. "So we think, 'If clowns can hide their emotions, what else might they be hiding?"

FIGHT THE FRIGHT

It's natural to avoid things that scare us. But psychologists say that to get over your fears – whether you're afraid of spiders, clowns, the dark, or, well, anything – you have to focus on them instead of avoiding them. Here are some useful tips to help you manage your fears...



THE FEAR: HEIGHTS

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Acrophobia

SPOOKY SCIENCE: When you're standing on solid ground, your eyes work with your inner ears to help you stay balanced. But if you're standing, say, at the edge of a cliff, your sense of balance can get out of whack. 

THE FEAR: DARKNESS

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Nyctophobia

SPOOKY SCIENCE: As with many phobias, it's thought humans developed a fear of the dark to avoid danger. Our ancestors had to be extra cautious at night to protect themselves against things like animal predators and human invaders. (This was before electric lighting!) "Many people still have that fear of the dark today," Martin Antony says. "It's a fear of the unknown."





THE FEAR: SMALL SPACES

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Claustrophobia

SPOOKY SCIENCE: Most people think taking the lift is no big deal. For others, though, just the **thought** of getting **trapped** inside a lift can cause them to take the stairs! "Small spaces might make some people worry about running out of oxygen, or never being able to get out – no matter how unlikely that is," says Martin. Some people are afraid of being trapped in cars or tunnels, and even

getting stuck in sleeping bags!

- Expose yourself to things that you're afraid of in a way that you feel safe. For example, if you fear public speaking, try practising in front of a mirror first, then give the speech to a small group of trusted friends.
- If you feel anxious, place one or both of your hands on your stomach and focus on breathing slowly and deeply. Regulating your breathing will help you feel calmer and can lessen your sense of panic.
- Don't be too hard on yourself! Everyone's afraid of something. Just make sure it doesn't stop you from living your life. Talk to an adult if it feels like too much to handle on your own.

NG KiDS chats to astrobiologist and aspiring astronaut Abby Harrison about her dream of setting foot on the surface of Mars...

- All you really need are your **eyes!** But if you'd like to get a little closer to the stars, borrow or buy a cheap pair of **binoculars**.
- Head online to download and print off a star map. Or make your own (try www.universe.wales/planisphere/). There are lots of good videos online that'll teach you how to use them.
- Alternatively, download an app for your smartphone, such as *Star Walk 2*, to help you view and identify stars!
- Head outside! But try to find a nice, open, dark spot without light pollution, such as street lights. Good luck!

Follow your heart in your studies and do what you love!

WANT TO BE AN ASTRONAUT?

STUDY: STEM subjects such as **science**, **technology** and **maths**, **plus languages** – but make sure you study the subjects you **love** the most.

WATCH: Ask Abby on YouTube (tinyurl.com/astronautabby), National Geographic's Journey to the Edge of the Universe, the BBC's documentary series Space, and the movie Apollo II.

READ: NG KiDS' Everything Space and the Science Museum's Planetarium

Since its creation, Abby's Mars Generation charity has funded 40 kids to attend NASA's Space Camp in the USA!

Abby read NG KiDS when she was a kid. She clearly has great taste!

Hi Abby! You founded The Mars Generation, a worldwide movement to get kids excited about space exploration - you now have almost a million followers on social media! How did that all come about?

When I was 13, I set up a Twitter account called **AstronautAbby** to get a **quote** from NASA for a school project. I found a community of people online who were just as **excited** about **space** as me. I was then asked by NASA to write an article for their education blog, I began attending major space events, and four years later I founded **The Mars Generation**. I want to inspire kids to **dream big**.

So how old were you when you first became interested in space?

I was **four** or **five** when I started **stargazing**. I spent a lot of time in my backyard looking up at the night sky and I'd ask my mum or teachers questions, like, "How big is the universe?" or "Why does that exist?"

They would always answer, "**We** don't know the answer to that **yet...**" And that made me want to **find the answers** myself! Why is your dream to go to Mars?

The winter skies in **Minnesota** where I grew up were **really** clear and Mars was always visible. Every time I went out I'd

think about what it would be like to walk on that surface. Then, when I got older, I found out that there's seasonally flowing water on the planet, and it has potential for life or has hosted lifeforms in the past. Wow! You're an astrobiologist. What does that mean?

Astrobiology is the study of life in space. One part of it is the search for alien lifeforms and it also includes what happens to life that we purposefully put into space – everything from bacteria to **humans**. It's fascinating!

You're on a quest to be an astronaut and kids can follow your preparation online. What sort of things have you done?

Among other things, I've learned to fly an aeroplane as it's a good stepping **stone** to becoming an astronaut – it's so much fun. I've learned **Russian**, been skydiving, and have been scuba diving since I was 14.

What's scuba diving got to do with space?! It's how astronauts train for microgravity, so it'll be easier for me to jump into astronaut training! Oceans are the closest things we have to **space** on Earth we've still got so much more to learn

about our oceans.

When are you going to Mars? Well, I'm still about **5–10 years** away from **applying** to be an astronaut, so I'm busy getting the skills, experiences and qualifications that will be required to be an astronaut. They haven't set a date for

Mars missions yet, but I'm hoping they'll be in my lifetime.

How long will it take astronauts to get to the red planet?

incredibly exciting About eight months. The place to research whole mission would last right now. We need about **three years** because an astrobiologist you have to wait for Earth on the surface to and Mars to be the **right** orbit to each other so you have the **shortest distance** to travel. That's with current technology, but who knows what it'll be like in 10–15 years time. We might have figured out how to travel faster by then.

Are you a teeny bit scared about visiting the planet?

Absolutely! Space travel is dangerous, especially when you're doing something that hasn't been done before – like sending people to Mars!

What's the 'closest' you've been to space? Hmm... When I was 13, my after-school club launched boxes into the exosphere, the last layer of our atmosphere between Earth and space. We **created our own experiments**, built the boxes, attached them to weather balloons and launched them. We put **cameras** inside, and when we got the pictures back they showed the curvature of the Earth. It was incredible! Wow! Wish our science classes had been that exciting! In 2013 you worked with Italian astronaut Luca Parmitano. Tell us about that!

While he was onboard the International Space Station (ISS), I was his 'Earth Liaison', helping share his experiences with people

on Earth. People would send me questions for him and I also visited schools to tell kids about his space mission! It all happened because I met him randomly at the airport on my way home from watching a Space Shuttle launch in Florida with my mum when

I was 13! I introduced myself and we stayed in touch!

Are there many female astronauts?

Out of the **550** or so people that have become astronauts, only about 50 have been women. We need more girls in space, engineering, maths, physics and aviation! Britain's first person in space was a woman, Helen Sharman...

Yes! She worked for the chocolate maker Mars before becoming an astronaut, so her story is a great example of how you don't have to be pigeon-holed into any one field of research or interest to become an astronaut. I'd love to have a **chocolatier** with me on the long journey to Mars! Haha, yes! Great chatting to you, Abby. **Good luck with your travels!**

Our solar system is made up of eight planets, all orbiting the Sun at different distances and speeds. Let's learn more...

SUN

Also known as Sol, the Sun, our central star, is at the centre of our solar system. The Sun is a massively hot, massively dense ball of gases. By far the largest and hottest object in our solar system, it provides light and heat energy, plus various forms of radiation, to all of the planets.

MERCURY

Mercury is the smallest planet and closest to the Sun. You might think it's unbelievably hot all the time, but Mercury has a thin atmosphere that doesn't help redistribute the Sun's heat. This causes wild temperature fluctuations. The side of Mercury that faces the Sun is around 430°C, but the side facing away is -163°C. Crazy!

VENUS

As the second rock from the Sun, Venus is Earth's closest neighbour. It's similar to Earth in size and mass, but because of its thick atmosphere, it's also the hottest planet in our solar system. Temperatures on Venus's rocky surface never go below 462°C. Blistering!

EARTH

Our home Earth is exactly the right distance from the Sun - 150 million km. At that distance, the temperature is just right, allowing water to remain in its liquid form. Any closer, and it would evaporate. Any further away, and it would freeze solid. In fact, 71% of Earth's surface is covered by water.

MARS

Mars is known as the 'red planet' and is one of four terrestrial, or rocky, planets in the solar system. The red appearance of Mars is caused by iron oxide, or rust, in the soil.

SATURN

A massive ball of gases, Saturn does not have a solid surface. The planet is best known for its rings. The nine continuous rings, plus other arcs, are made of rock, ice and dust. Saturn also has at least 62 moons. One of them, Titan, is larger than the planet Mercury!

JUPITER

The fifth planet from the Sun, Jupiter, is a gas giant. This means it's made up of gases and liquids that most likely surround a core of hot, thick 'soup' instead of solid rock. Its atmosphere is composed of turbulent clouds of chemical gases that swirl in massive storms. Jupiter has 50 known moons, but scientists believe there could be at least 17 more!

URANUS

The seventh planet from the Sun, and the third largest in diameter, Uranus was only discovered in 1781. That's thousands of years after many of the other planets were spotted.

NEPTUNE

The furthest planet from the Sun, Neptune, like its neighbour Uranus, is called an 'ice giant'. It's made up of gases, ice and rock. Temperatures on the planet are beyond frosty - about -210°C.

Our solar system is **4.6 billion** years old!

ASTEROID BELT

The planets are divided by an asteroid belt, a 320-million-km-wide ring of massive rocks that are too small to be planets.

YOUR SPACE QUESTIONS ANSWERED!

WHAT IS SPACE?

That's a famously hard question to answer. The simple response is that space is everything in the universe beginning about 100km above Earth. Of course, to astronomers and astrophysicists, the scientists who study space, it's much more. It's a never-ending mystery!

WHAT IS A PLANET?

A planet is a large body of rock, gas or other material orbiting a star in space. Some planets are **small** and **rocky**, such as Mercury. Others are huge and gassy, such as Jupiter. A planet can have one or more **moons** orbiting around it.

WHAT IS ATMOSPHERE?

Some planets, such as Earth, have an atmosphere, or a layer of gases that surrounds and protects them. Earth's atmosphere has five main layers. The outermost layer, called the exosphere, merges with outer space.

The Andromeda galaxy. contains a trillion stars!

WHAT IS A GALAXY?

A galaxy is a collection of stars and planets held together by gravity. Galaxies can take different shapes. For example, the galaxy we Earthlings live in, the Milky Way, is a spiral galaxy. That means it's shaped like a whirlpool in which stars, planets and all other materials rotate around a central point. Some galaxies are shaped like a watermelon, or like a tadpole with a round head and a trailing tail. There are also double and multiple galaxies, where more than one galaxy is linked together.





FUN STUFF

Go trick-or-treating in a cool ho

- Tape measure
- Black fabric at least 2m by 1m in size
- Black marker
- Scissors
- Hot-glue gun or Superglue
- String or twine
- Cardboard
- Black paint
- 2 hair grips

Start

Ask a parent or friend to use a measuring tape to find the distance between your fingertips when your arms are outstretched. Cut a rectangle of fabric that is the length of your 'wingspan' by 1m deep.



Fold the fabric in half lengthways, then draw three 'scallops' diagonally across the fabric with the marker.



Cut the fabric along the outline, then unfold the fabric and lay it on a flat surface.

TOP TIP

Trick-or-treat with a reusable cloth bag or pillowcase instead of a plastic bucket or bag.



Cut two 8-cm-long pieces of string or twine and twist each into a loop as shown.



Ask an adult to stick one loop near the tip of each wing using a hot-glue gun or Superglue. These will be the finger loops to hold your wings in place!

Halloween

To wear your costume, dress all in black and then drape the bat wings against your back, looping the strings around one finger on each hand. Use hair grips to secure the ears to your hair, or glue them to an old headband.



To make the ears, cut two triangles from the cardboard, about 6cm wide and 9cm tall.



Paint the triangles black and, when dry, fold the bottom of the triangles to form a base. Fasten them to your hair with grips.



FIZZY BOTTLE ROCKETS

Make a self-propelled rocket from a recycled sports bottle!

need

Small (500ml or less) sports drinks bottle with a cap lid which pops open



Mug, glass or jar that allows an upside-down bottle to fit inside with lid touching bottom



1. Unscrew the lid of your bottle and make sure the pop-up lid is firmly pressed down.

- 2. Half-fill the bottle with warm water. Break two fizzy tablets in half and drop them into the bottle.
- 3. Quickly screw the lid back on firmly, give the bottle a shake and and place it upside down in the mug or jar.
- 4. Stand back and wait for it to blast off! Allow at least three minutes before checking the rocket. If it hasn't launched, try again with slightly warmer water.





What's going on?

Fizzy tablets contain a chemical which reacts with water to produce carbon dioxide gas. This gas builds up inside the bottle until the pressure is enough to pop the lid. This pushes down on the bottom of the glass, which results in an upwards push on the bottle. Once in the air, the liquid firing out of the bottle pushes it even further, just like the gases coming out of a real rocket!

Experiment with the temperature, different sizes of bottle and the number of tablets to find out what combo gives you the highest flying rocket!

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

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
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
