
The latest news from around the globe...

Easy key-sy.

The record for the number of people playing a piano at the same time has been smashed by kids from around the UK! Eighty-eight young ivory ticklers played one key each on a grand piano, using crazy mechanical fingers they'd designed themselves.

More than 2,500 key-bashing inventions were entered into a competition, and the winning 88 were then built by engineers led by the University of Cambridge! Our faves were a banana gun, a toothbrush pushed by a windmill and a see-saw made of walking sticks. Amazingly, the wacky musicians managed to make a decent tune!





Salmon cannon

Salmon are famous for swimming upstream and scaling waterfalls to get back to their breeding grounds. But even the strongest salmon can't get past a human-built dam. Which is where the Whooshh Passage Portal comes in!

The giant 'salmon cannon' was invented to **shoot fish over the dams**, allowing them to continue their epic journeys. The inventor says it's a smooth and stress-free ride, with salmon gliding through the tube at 35kmph!

The technology has been around for about five years, but it went viral again recently, and many people are now demanding a human version! Wouldn't that be fin-tastic?!

OLD GADGETS

You probably have a drawer full of unused phones, laptops and tablets at home, right? Here's why you should recycle them...

A new survey suggests that there are more than 40 million old gadgets sitting in people's homes across the UK. But our old smart devices contain precious metals and rare elements – and up to 80% of old phones can be **recycled**!

According to the Royal Society of Chemistry, there are at least 30 natural elements in a smartphone and we could run out of six of the rarest in the next 100 years. But that's not the only reason to recycle gadgets. Mining for precious elements is difficult, dangerous work, and may destroy wildlife habitats.

The good news is YOU can help! Start by encouraging your parents to recycle their old gadgets. Just ask them to send them back to the manufacturer or head to tinyurl.com/ recyclemobiles to find out more.





Big ol' birds

The **fossilised remains** of a **gigantic** penguin have been found in Waipara, **New Zealand!**

The **Crossvallia waiparensis**, discovered by amateur fossil hunter Leigh Love, measured a whopping 1.6m tall (roughly the same height as the average person) and weighed four times as much as the current biggest living penguin species, the emperor penguin.

But penguins aren't the only big birds to have once lived in New Zealand. Palaeontologists there have also recently found fossils that belong to the largest parrot ever to have existed – the 1-m-tall Heracles inexpectat. Scientists say huge avians thrived in the area because there were almost no mammal predators.


Fire Maker Guy Jones

I liked the rhyming lines and funny pictures. This book is part of a series but you can enjoy it without having to read the others.



But things weren't always so wonderful – **30 years ago**, Costa Rica was in trouble. Its rainforests were being **destroyed**, and rare wildlife was in danger of **disappearing** forever. So the government made some big changes! **They:**

- Spent money on education instead of the military, teaching people how to look after and appreciate nature!
- Replanted rainforests, paid landowners not to chop down trees, and protected 26% of the land by turning it into national parks!
- Promoted eco-tourism so that visitors could enjoy all the nature, without harming it!














The serval might look strange, but its funny features are perfect for hunting...

A serval sits patiently in a grassy field, swivelling its head back and forth like a watchful owl. The predator is scanning the African savannah for a meal – not with its eyes, but with its oversized ears.

An unseen rodent stirs under the thick brush, and the wild cat **tenses**. It crouches on its legs and feet before **launching** itself up and over the tall grass. Guided only by **sound**, the serval lands directly on the rat.

Thanks to its extra-long legs, stretched-out neck and huge ears, the serval is sometimes called the 'cat of spare parts.'
"The wild cat might look weird to some people, but their bizarre-looking body parts make them really successful hunters," says

Christine Thiel-Bender, a biologist who studies servals in the wild in Africa.

In fact, servals catch their prey in over half of their attempts, a 20% better success rate than lions hunting together in a pride. In fact, they're one of the best hunters in the wild cat kingdom.

Read on to discover some weird ways servals are the ultimate hunters...















Servals and ocelots are both small, solitary, nocturnal hunters. Take a look at other ways these wild cats stack up...

WHERE THEY LIVE

Grassy **savannah** and wetlands in parts of **northwest** Africa and much of sub-Saharan Africa.

Tropical forests, shrublands, and **grasslands** in South, Central and North America.

A LEG UP

Once a serval's ears have pinpointed prey, their long legs jump in to help catch dinner. "Servals look small and delicate," Christine says, "but they're incredibly agile cats." Their legs - the longest of any cat when compared to overall size - give them a lot of power. A 91-cm-long serval can leap almost 4m horizontally to pounce on a rat, with no running start necessary! They can also jump around 3m into the air to swipe a bird. That's like YOU leaping over an adult giraffe!

The sneaky cat's ability to pounce from far away means unsuspecting prey won't hear its footsteps or detect its scent. "Most prey don't even know the serval is coming until they've been caught," Christine says. Yikes!



TINY TAILS

Big ears, long legs and lengthy necks... it would make sense for a serval to have a superlong tail as well, right? But they don't! Long tails help animals like lemurs keep their balance in their forest homes. They're also important for animals that run longer distances, like cheetahs, to control their steering while sprinting. However, servals do none of that. In fact, a long tail would get in the way of their leaping abilities, so a shorter tail actually helps them survive!

NOT-SO-FANCY FEAST


Another way servals qualify as hunting champs is that they're flexible when they're choosing what to hunt. These cats mostly dine on rodents – on average, one serval eats 4,000 a year – but they're not picky eaters like some other wild cats.

"Servals will eat anything small enough for them to catch," says Christine, who's examined the contents of serval poo. "I found grasshoppers and snakes, as well as rodents. Other cats don't normally eat such a wide variety of animals." Servals also often eat birds – from small ones like weavers to larger storks and guinea fowl. They'll even wade into water to gobble up frogs and other amphibians!

Also unlike most other wild cats, servals turn up their noses at other predators' leftovers. "It's probably because they're already such successful hunters," Christine says. "They don't need to go looking for another animal's meal."

MORE COOL CATS!

Shy and rarely seen, many of the world's smallest wild cats are experts at avoiding attention. Check out some of these lesser-known felines...



Sand cats live in the deserts of North Africa and the Middle East. Thick fur on their paws protects them from the hot sand and helps them walk without sinking.





Known as 'fire tigers', Asiatic golden cats live in the Southeast Asian countries of Myanmar and Thailand.

India and Sri Lanka's rusty-spotted cat is only 30cm long (not including its tail) and weighs just 1.3kg!

A GLOBAL MOYEMENT

The Swedish media started writing about her strike. And Greta spread the word on social media, too. After a few weeks,



protests started spreading to other Swedish cities. Soon, motivated by Greta's protest, young people all over the world set up their own campaign groups. They all worked together to co-ordinate the first Global Strike for the Climate in March this year. It was huge – over 1.6 million people from 125 countries took part!

HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

Since her strike began, Greta's life has become a whirlwind! She's given rousing speeches to politicians, to the EU parliament, the **UK parliament**, to **protesters** and more. She's appeared in documentaries and had loads of books and articles written about her. She's even been nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize! Her message IS getting through. But there's still more to be done. This month, Greta will be at the United Nations Climate Action

Summit in **New** York, USA, where she'll demand action from world leaders. With the power of the planet's children behind her, let's hope they finally start to act!

reverse the effects Some young people are taking part in the Fridays for Future movement and striking from school every Friday, just like Greta. Others take part in the big national or global strikes.

When is the next global strike?

The next worldwide protest is on Friday 20 September. It takes place just before the UN Climate Action Summit on 23 September so people can send a loud and clear message - politicians must act now!

How do I take part and will I get into trouble?

Firstly, and most importantly, get permission from your parents! If they agree, then talk to your school to explain what you're doing and why. Some schools are more supportive than others. It's legal to strike if you have the school's permission.

How can I make the most impact?

Make a sign to let people know why you're striking. Short and snappy slogans work best. If you're on social media, let your friends know about it. And keep it peaceful!

Can grown-ups get involved, too?

Yes! You might not be able persuade them to turn vegan and give up air travel like Greta's parents did, but they can join the strike! As Greta says, "Everybody is welcome, everybody is needed!" Lots of adults are very concerned about the climate, too – you may have heard of another climate action group called Extinction Rebellion who have been supporting the youth movement.

Why are some people mean about Greta?

Not everyone likes what Greta is doing. Some say she's spreading 'climate panic' and that children should not be missing school. Or that she's a 'puppet' for another organisation and doesn't know her own mind. Others have made mean personal comments about her. But Greta doesn't let it bother her. She says these criticisms are a distraction from the real issues – her critics should be talking about the climate crisis instead of her! And she argues that there's no point studying if there's going to be no future.

"If a few children can get headlines all over the world just for not going to school for a few weeks, imagine what we could all do together if we wanted!" Greta







DIAMONDS OR DUDS?

People used to believe that diamonds were made by bolts of lightning! That sounds cool, but it's not true - they actually develop deep in the ground, under great pressure. Diamonds are the crystalline form of carbon, but there's another form of crystalline material that happens to look like a diamond. It's called cubic zirconia – or CZ – and it's worth a LOT less!

If you want to check whether a sparkler is legit and not a CZ imposter, the easiest way is with the 'fog test'. Simply breathe a puff of air on the diamond in question. If the fog disappears right away, congrats, it's real! But if it takes longer to go away, you might have a CZ on your hands. Fog doesn't show up on real diamonds because the stones transfer heat so well that the fog evaporates instantly.



Nifty know-how: LIGHT

To ensure the light hits your subject from the best possible angle, you might need to reposition the light, the subject or yourself. See what a big difference the direction of light makes to this humble tennis ball...






Front light

When something is lit from the **front**, the shadows are cast **behind** the subject. This


causes the subject to look a bit flat because there are no shadows to give form to the features.



Side light


When the light comes from the side, one half

of the subject will be bright and the other half dark. This is a nice classic style of lighting, especially when taking pictures of faces.



Overhead light


When the light shines on a subject from **above**, shadows are cast **downwards**. This can be dramatic – but **not so flattering on faces**.



Back light

When the light comes

from behind the subject, all the shadows are thrown forwards, creating a silhouette. This can look cool, but the shadows will mean you won't see any detail in a subject.

HOMEMADE PARACHUTES

Recycle household objects and have air-mazing fun!

- 1. Take an empty, clean yoghurt pot and securely tape four identical lengths of string to each of its corners.
- 2. Tie the other end of each of the lengths of string to the handles on an old plastic carrier bag (two spread out on each handle).
- 3. Draw a face on an egg and then put it inside the yoghurt pot.

Make sure there's no risk of your parachute and pot hitting anyone on the way down!





4. Now test your parachute! Drop it from a decent height (maybe out of an upstairs window) and then check to see if your egg survived the journey!

Time to experiment! Instead of using a bag, try making your parachute out of different materials, and try a variety of shapes and sizes.

What's going on?

A parachute is successful if it gets the **object** (or *person*!) it's attached to safely to the ground. To do this it should fall as **slowly** as possible. The **more air** there is pushing against the parachute (air resistance), the slower it goes.

Tips for a perfect parachute

You can increase air resistance by making the surface area as large as possible. This will mean the parachute needs to move more air out of the way in order to fall, which takes time. If your parachute inflates (fills with air) as it falls, this also increases the surface area. Lighter materials usually inflate better. Circles are often the best shapes – those with corners let air escape at the sides.




