### **Australia's Giant Toads**

How did cane toads get to Australia, and why do people see them as such a pest?

- Think about toads that you may have seen in the woods, on a hike, or at a zoo. How large do you think they were? Even the largest toads probably were not as big as the cane toad. This toad, native to South America and the Caribbean, can weigh as much as four pounds!
- <sup>2</sup> In 1935, sugar cane farmers in Australia were having a problem with two types of beetles that were destroying their crops. About one hundred cane toads were shipped to Australia from Hawaii. People hoped the toads would be a solution to the problem. Unfortunately, things turned out very differently than they had anticipated. The cane toads quickly became a more annoying pest than the beetles had ever been.
- There are several things that make the cane toad so unusual. First of all, the cane toad has almost no natural predators. If the cane toad feels threatened, it will secrete a poisonous liquid. This liquid can kill children and small animals. It can even blind an adult for several hours.
- The cane toad is also poisonous in all stages of its life. Fish normally feed on the eggs of frogs and toads, but even the eggs of the cane toad are poisonous. Each pair of cane toads can produce more than 30,000 eggs each season. Because many of the eggs and tadpoles are able to mature, the cane toad population can grow very rapidly.
- This is exactly what happened in Australia. Without any predators, there were suddenly thousands of cane toads in the Queensland area. People might have been more tolerant if the animals had been successful in getting rid of the sugar cane beetles. It turned out, however, that the cane toads did not have any effect on the beetles, which could easily fly out of harm's way.

The Australians are not quite sure how to get rid of cane toads. In fact, they continue to spread across the continent. Cane toads eat many types of Australian wildlife. They can also be dangerous to pets and children. Even so, not everyone in Australia hopes that the plans to rid the country of these animals will be successful. Some people even leave food in their backyards or adopt the giant toads as pets!

### **Aussie Animals**

How are the animals in Australia different from those you might see where you live?

- Gemma, Kayla, and Vijay were eating lunch on the small patio behind the school's cafeteria. Kayla and Vijay were asking Gemma questions about Australian animals. They couldn't believe that Gemma didn't think it was anything special to see a kangaroo hopping along the side of a road or grazing in a field.
- "When you see something all the time," Gemma explained, "you hardly even notice it. Do you know how many times you've seen a squirrel, or a deer, or a raccoon in your life?"
- <sup>3</sup> "Of course not," said Vijay. "But seeing a kangaroo would be completely different."
- <sup>4</sup> Gemma laughed. "Not if you lived in Australia," she said.
- <sup>5</sup> "Is it true that a mother kangaroo carries her baby in her pouch?" asked Kayla.
- "Sure," replied Gemma, pausing to take a bite of her sandwich. "Aussies call baby kangaroos *joeys*. They live in their mother's pouch until they grow a bit larger. Then, they can take care of themselves and keep up with the others in their group. Did you know that kangaroos can travel more than 30 miles per hour?"

- <sup>8</sup> "Do any other animals carry their babies in a pouch?" wondered Kayla aloud.
- <sup>9</sup> "The koala and the wombat do," said Gemma. "They are marsupials like the kangaroo."
- <sup>10</sup> "I know what a koala bear is," said Vijay, "but what is a wombat?"
- "Well, a koala isn't really a bear," Gemma explained. "People just call them that because they resemble a teddy bear. Koalas spend most of their lives sleeping. There is a type of tree called a *eucalyptus* (*yoo kah LIP tuss*) that grows in Australia. It's pretty much the only thing that koalas eat. They don't get much energy from the leaves, though, which is why they spend so much time sleeping."
- <sup>12</sup> "It sounds like they need a change in their diet," laughed Vijay. "Is the wombat similar to the koala and kangaroo?"
- "The only real similarity is that it is a marsupial, too. Otherwise, the wombat looks like a beaver or a groundhog. It burrows underground and makes tunnels that are 10 to 15 feet long. Some people get wombats as babies and train them. I had a friend who had a very nice pet wombat named Gillian."
- "Won't you miss the animals in Australia?" asked Kayla. "No one in Massachusetts has a wombat for a pet."



### The First Australians

Who are the Aboriginal people of Australia?

- The Aboriginal people are the original inhabitants of Australia. Archaeologists believe that they have lived in Australia for about 50,000 to 60,000 years! Today, they make up a little more than two percent of the population of Australia.
- In the past, Aboriginal people were hunters and gatherers. This means that they survived by hunting, fishing, and gathering plants. They did not settle permanently in one place. Instead, they moved around the continent when they needed to refresh their supply of food. The Aboriginal people had, and still have, a strong respect for and connection to the land and nature. It influences almost every part of their culture, from food and shelter, to art and religion.
- Things quickly changed for the Aboriginal people when Europeans began arriving in Australia in 1788. They brought diseases that the Aboriginal people had never been exposed to before. The Aboriginal people also had to fight for the land that was theirs. There were many years of difficult times. The Aboriginal people had to learn to live in a society that was very different from their ancestors'. They had to fight to keep their culture alive.

- The situation started to improve for the Aboriginal people in the 1960s. They were finally given the right to vote. Later, the Australian government also began trying to make up for some of the unfair treatment the people had suffered. They returned some of the land to the Aboriginal people that had been taken from them more than a century before.
- The contributions of Aboriginal people to Australia can be seen in many areas. For example, they created the boomerang, a curved piece of wood that has been used both as a weapon and for sport. Aboriginal rock paintings can be found in many areas of Australia. Some are believed to be 30,000 years old. The didgeridoo (*didge er ee DOO*) is a well-known Australian wind instrument. It is a straight trumpet made from a hollow piece of wood or bamboo. Some people believe it may be one of the world's oldest wind instruments.
- The Aboriginal people are an important and valuable part of Australian society. Today, many still live a traditional lifestyle in the bush, or Australian wilderness. Others have become a part of modern-day Australian culture and live in cities around the country. Their influences can be found in many aspects of Australian life.



### STOMP!

What kind of everyday objects could you use to make music?

- You might have used pencils to tap a rhythm on your desk or noticed that the ringing sound of basketballs was almost like the beat to a song. But did you know that these sounds could be taken seriously as music and even performed onstage?
- <sup>2</sup> The dance and percussion group STOMP has taken everyday objects and turned them into instruments. The performers strap oil drums to their feet and smash trash can lids together. This creates an exciting rhythmic music and dance that is a hit all over the world.
- STOMP was formed by British musicians Luke Cresswell and Steve McNichols. They met in the early 1980s when they were both working as buskers, the British term for street performers. Busking has a long tradition in England and is still a popular way for musicians and actors to share their talents. The performers have to be extra creative and enticing to be able to capture the attention of people who are walking by. Cresswell and McNichols were part of a busking group called *Pookiesnackenburger* that became very popular throughout Britain. Eventually, they even had their own television show.
- 4 Cresswell was a drummer for the group. Because they performed on the street, he could not set up a traditional drum set. Instead, he wore one drum that hung around his shoulders. To be able to make a variety of sounds, Cresswell began beating on objects like lampposts and trash cans that were available wherever the group performed. This creative drumming formed the idea for STOMP.
- STOMP made its debut at London's Bloomsbury Theater in 1991. The performers used one-of-a-kind instruments, such as brooms, empty water jugs, basketballs, and matchboxes to bang out rhythms. Wearing overalls and T-shirts, they danced around on a stage made to look like a closed warehouse. STOMP was an

- instant success, winning many theater awards and drawing huge crowds.
- In 1994, STOMP came to the United States and played at the Orpheum Theater in New York City. A decade later it is still playing there! To honor its ten-year anniversary, New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg renamed the street outside of the theater STOMP Avenue.
- STOMP has now toured all over the United States and most of the world. One reason STOMP is so popular is that anyone can enjoy it. There are no words or story. People from all cultures can understand it, regardless of the language they speak.

### The Best Hoofer of All

How did Savion Glover bring tap dancing into the 21st century?

- What comes to mind when you think of tap dancing? You might picture a black-and-white movie with a performer dressed in a tuxedo. Tap dancing might not seem like something popular and modern. If that is how you picture tap, then you have never seen Savion Glover dance! This choreographer, dancer, director, and producer has changed the way people think about tap dancing today.
- <sup>2</sup> Savion Glover was born in New Jersey in 1973. He showed a talent for drumming when he was only four years old, so he began going to school at the Newark Community School of the Arts. By the time he was seven, he had begun taking rhythm tap classes at the Broadway Dance Center in New York. Rhythm tap is a special kind of dance that uses all the parts of the foot to create sounds.
- When Savion began taking tap lessons, his family could not afford the special shoes he needed. Savion had to wear a pair of cowboy boots to his first lesson! Just a few years later, Savion landed his first role in a Broadway performance, *The Tap Dance Kid*.

- <sup>4</sup> Savion continued working in a variety of areas. He learned much of what he knew about tap dancing from masters like Sammy Davis, Junior and Gregory Hines. He participated in other Broadway productions, and he even made a movie. Savion also became well-known for his recurring role on the children's television show *Sesame Street*.
- in a production called *Bring in 'Da Noise, Bring in 'Da Funk.* The show, which followed African American history from the times of slavery through the 20th century, was extremely popular. People loved its energy. They were amazed at how the story could be expressed through dance. *Bring in 'Da Noise, Bring in 'Da Funk* won four Tony Awards, the highest honor a musical can receive. One of those awards was for best choreographer,
- The style of tap that Savion is best known for is often called *hoofing*, or street tap. It is a hard-hitting form of tap, and the movements are more acrobatic than those of traditional tap. Savion's work combines elements of jazz, funk, hip-hop, rock 'n' roll, and the blues to create something unique and exciting. People love to watch Savion's feet move. It is hard to keep up with them, but that is part of the fun in watching Savion Glover perform!



### **Green Roofs**

Have you ever seen a rooftop garden?

- Why would anyone want to plant a garden on a roof? People are finding out that it is good for the environment and good for them. The roof of a building can get extremely hot, especially if it is covered in tar. Dark colors absorb the light of the sun, which causes them to become hotter than things that are light in color.
- <sup>2</sup> Cities can be as much as four to ten degrees warmer than rural areas. Green rooftops can actually help cool the air in cities. A single green roof will not do much to change the temperature of a city. However, when more buildings begin to convert their rooftops to green spaces, a real difference can occur. Buildings that are cooler also use air conditioning less often. This reduces the amount of energy a building uses, which is good for the environment.



- <sup>3</sup> Cities are usually more polluted than other areas. The addition of plants to rooftops can even help clean the air. Plants use carbon dioxide and produce oxygen. Because people breathe oxygen, a large number of plants in an area creates more breathable air. Gardens in the city can also provide a place for birds and bugs to live.
- 4 One unusual rooftop garden is located above Children's Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri. The garden covers an area of 7,500 square feet. It is a place for the children and their parents to relax and be close to nature without leaving the hospital. The garden has flowers, fountains, and even a goldfish pond. There are also paths that children can walk on in slippers or with bare feet.
- Another interesting garden is on the rooftop of the Royal York Hotel in Toronto, Canada. A large herb garden has been planted on the roof. The hotel's chefs can pick all of the herbs they use fresh from the roof. Other hotels and restaurants maintain gardens where they grow fruits and vegetables to use in cooking. They just need to make sure that there are gardeners to care for the plants. Rooftop gardens can dry out quickly in the summer sun, and vegetables need frequent watering.
- Why don't all buildings have green rooftops? One reason is that they can be more expensive than traditional rooftops. However, they may save a company on heating and cooling bills in the future. Also, a roof needs to be flat and strong enough to support the weight of the garden.
- Many people do not know about rooftop gardens and how good they can be for the environment. But word is starting to get out. You may want to keep your eyes on the skies when you walk the streets in your town or city. You never know when you might catch a glimpse of a secret garden many feet above the ground.

### Wasteful or Resourceful?

How green is your school? What about your home or the places your parents work?

- What can people do to help the places they go every day become friendlier to the environment? Large buildings are often hard on the environment. The good news is that there are many ways even the biggest offenders can make improvements.
- One problem is the amount of energy that is used every day in large buildings. Rooftop gardens are one way to reduce the amount of energy needed to air condition a building in the summer and heat it in the winter. But rooftop gardens are not the only solution. Some companies have installed solar panels. This allows them to gather energy from the sun and then turn it into electricity. Solar panels can be expensive, but companies that want to make protecting the environment a priority think it is worth the money.
- other companies have all kinds of special gadgets that help save energy. For example, in some offices, lights automatically go out when a person leaves a room. The plumbing is set up in a way that allows water to be reused. In new buildings, recycled materials might even be a part of the walls or the floor. Tile can be made using recycled glass. Floors can be made from old tires. Walls can even be insulated with newspaper or bales of straw.
- You do not need to live in a green building or go to a green school in order to help the environment. There are lots of things you can do on your own. For example, turn off the water when you brush your teeth. Turn off the lights when you leave a room. If you can walk or ride your bike somewhere, do that instead of riding in a car.
- Does your school recycle paper? If it does not, see if you can work with a teacher to start a recycling program. Do you know what happens to the food that is not used in your school's cafeteria? Maybe it can be donated to a local food bank.

You can also tell people you know about ways they can help the environment. The more people you tell, the more people will become aware of things they can reuse and recycle. The sooner that happens, the sooner we'll be able to see a healthy change in the world around us.

### Where the Poetry Begins

What is your favorite poem? Who is your favorite poet?

- Who is your favorite poet? For many young people, the answer is Shel Silverstein. Shel's first book was published in the 1960s, and since then his children's books have sold more than 20 million copies! Young people recognize that Shel really understood his audience.
- Shel Silverstein was born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1932. He began writing poetry when he was young. He was not familiar with the work of any famous poets, so he invented his own style. This turned out to be a good thing, because style is one of the most distinctive things about Shel's poetry.
- Although he was best known for writing children's literature, Shel was creative in many ways. He began his career in the arts as a cartoonist. He also was a talented singer, songwriter, composer, and illustrator. In fact, Shel illustrated all of his children's books himself. This is one reason the pictures seem to accompany the poetry so perfectly.

- <sup>4</sup> Where the Sidewalk Ends, first published in 1984, is one of the most beloved children's books of all time. But what makes Shel's poetry so timeless and popular? His poems are often hilarious, and young people love Shel's type of humor.
- In one poem, he told the story of a girl who refused to take out the garbage. It piled up higher and higher until it finally threatened to take over the town. Many kids have experienced the feeling of not wanting to do a chore. They love how out of control the author let the situation get because they know that it would never happen that way in real life.
- In another popular poem, a girl pretends to be sick so that she will not have to attend school. Shel made fun of the situation by having the character exaggerate her symptoms to the point where they became ridiculous. The punch line of the poem occurs at the end. The girl discovers that it is Saturday, and she would not have had to go to school anyway.
- Shel also liked to play with language in his poetry. He often used elements like alliteration in his work. *Alliteration* is the use of words that begin with the same sounds. In the poem about the girl who refused to take out the garbage, the character's name is Sarah Cynthia Sylvia Stout. This type of alliteration can make poetry fun to read aloud. Shel's poems also often rhymed and had a good rhythm, two more elements that make his work easy and interesting to read.
- <sup>8</sup> In 1999, Shel Silverstein died in his home in Key West, Florida. Children and adults will miss his quirky humor and incredible imagination. But a bit of Shel Silverstein is captured in his work, which will live on and bring joy to children for many generations to come.



### **An Everyday Poet**

- Naomi Shihab Nye has lots of things to write about. She never seems to run out of ideas. Naomi writes poetry for young people and adults, but she is also the author of essays, children's picture books, songs, and a novel for teenagers. In addition, she has edited several poetry anthologies.
- Where does Naomi get her ideas? She is a great observer of the world around her. She sees poetry in the details of everyday life, like the way things smell or taste, the sounds of nature, the voices of her family, and the colors of a flower or a bird's wing or a strawberry.
- Naomi's poetry is also often influenced by places she has lived and visited. Naomi was raised by her Palestinian father and American mother. She grew up in St. Louis, Missouri; Jerusalem, Israel; and San Antonio, Texas. Each of these places has unique flavors that Naomi has captured with her rich, descriptive language.
- Anomi also writes about her dual cultures and the conflict between the Israelis and Palestinians in the Middle East. Today, Naomi lives with her family in San Antonio. She knows many people who have a Mexican-American heritage, and she works their experiences into her poetry. Naomi focuses on the ways that people of different cultures and backgrounds are similar rather than different. She has even traveled to the Middle East and Asia to promote international goodwill through the arts. Naomi firmly believes in the power of writing to change the world and help people find common ground.
- Naomi Shihab Nye began writing poetry as soon as she learned how to write. She published her first poem when she was only seven years old! Since that time, Naomi has written and edited more than 20 books. She advises young writers to write about their daily lives—the things they observe and the feelings they have. That's a good reminder for any writer!

# Spelling Their Way to Success

What would it be like to be a contestant in one of the most famous spelling bees in the world?

- Have you ever participated in a school or community spelling bee? If you have, you know how exciting it is and how intense the competition can be. No one knows this better than the contestants in the Annual Scripps Howard National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C. Every year, the best spellers come together to compete for the \$12,000 grand prize and the honor of winning such a prestigious competition.
- The first event was held in 1925 and was sponsored by a Kentucky newspaper, the *Louisville Courier-Journal*. A national bee has been held every year since then, except for 1943, 1944, and 1945 because of World War II. There were only nine contestants that first year. Today, there are more than 250 competitors. The sponsors, mostly newspapers, hold competitions in their communities. The winners of these spelling bees meet in Washington, D.C. for the national competition.
- There are many rules and restrictions for the national bee. The contestants must be under 16 years of age and must not be in a grade higher than the eighth grade. There may be as many as five rounds. All of the spelling is done orally, except in the first round when the contestants must take a written test. After a spelling word is given to a contestant, he or she is allowed to ask for the word's pronunciation, definition, and language of origin. The contestant can even request that the word be used in a sentence.
- <sup>4</sup> You might wonder how all of these pieces of information could help someone spell an unfamiliar word. The competitors spend many hours studying the spellings of specific words. But even more importantly, they learn patterns that they can use when they do not know a word.
- <sup>5</sup> Being able to break a word down into its parts can also help. Imagine having to spell the word *arachnophobia*. This sounds like a difficult word, but the definition, *a fear of spiders*, contains a couple of clues. If you know the



Greek word *phobos* means *fear* and the Greek word for spider is *arachne*, *arachnophobia* becomes much simpler to spell.

No matter how much studying the contestants do, there is no way for them to predict what the word will be when it is their turn to take the microphone. Here is a list of some of the winning words from the last seven decades of national bees: *chlorophyll*, *crustaceology*, *insouciant*, *chihuahua*, *sarcophagus*, *logorrhea*, *esquamulose*, and *milieu*. If you can spell any of these words, you just might have a future as a Scripps Howard National Spelling Bee champ.

- 2. First, preheat the oven to 350°F. Then, chop the green bell pepper. Place the oil, pepper, and onion in the skillet, and cook over medium heat. Sauté the vegetables for about five minutes.
- **3.** Remove the skillet from the burner. Open both cans of beans, and place them in the colander. Rinse the beans in cool water, and drain well.

- **4.** Add tomatoes, salsa, oregano, and salt to the skillet, and stir well. Next, add the beans to the mixture.
- 5. Coat the baking dish with cooking spray. Combine the two cheeses in a bowl. Then, spread one-third of the bean mixture on the bottom of the dish. Top with four tortillas, and sprinkle with one-third of the cheese. Now, add another layer of the bean mixture, four more tortillas, and another third of the cheese. Add the last layer of beans, and cover the dish with aluminum foil. Reserve the remaining cheese.
- 6. Bake the casserole for about 40 minutes. Then, remove the foil and add the remaining cheese. Put the casserole back in the oven, and bake it until the cheese topping is hot and bubbly. Allow the casserole to cool slightly before serving. This recipe makes six servings.

# A Big Victory for a Small Army

What do people celebrate on Cinco de Mayo?

- Have you ever attended a *Cinco de Mayo* festival? If you have not, you do not know what you are missing. In Spanish, the words *cinco de mayo* mean *fifth of May*. It is a day for celebration and pride in Mexican heritage. It is celebrated both in Mexico and in parts of the United States, especially the Southwest, where there is a larger Hispanic population.
- <sup>2</sup> In 1862, the French attacked the Mexican army. They were fighting for control of Mexico. They planned to quickly defeat the Mexican army and allow Emperor Maximilian of Austria to become Mexico's ruling monarch. The French did not anticipate many problems in the battle for power in Mexico. Their army was larger, stronger, and better trained than the Mexican



- army. This is why it came as a great surprise to the French when they were defeated in just a few hours at the Battle of Puebla, under the direction of General Ignacio Zaragoza, on May 5, 1862.
- This victory was an enormous triumph for Mexico. Unfortunately, it did not last long. The French returned in 1863 with even greater force and conquered the country. The French occupation lasted only until 1867, when Mexico was able to take back power with some support from the United States. *Cinco de Mayo* is a celebration of the spirit of the Mexican people.
- <sup>4</sup> Cinco de Mayo fiestas (fee ESS tahs), or celebrations, vary from place to place. One of the biggest of all takes place in the Mexican town of Puebla, where the French army was defeated in 1862. The festivals often last for more than one day. There is plenty of traditional Mexican food, as well as music, dancing, games, parades, decorations, and fireworks. There may also be a reenactment of the Battle of Puebla. People dress up as the French and Mexican soldiers. After a pretend battle, the Mexican general wins a swordfight with the French general, and the celebrating continues.
- One Mexican tradition that is popular with children at *Cinco de Mayo fiestas* is the *piñata* (*pin YAH tah*). A *piñata* is a colorful object often made of papier-mâché and cardboard. It is stuffed with all kinds of treats, such as candy and small gifts. Children take turns being blindfolded and trying to break open the *piñata* with a large stick so the goodies can spill out on the ground.
- The next time the fifth of May is coming near, see if you can find a *Cinco de Mayo fiesta* near you. If you can't, invite your friends over and hold one of your own. Ask an adult to help you make some simple, traditional Mexican dishes. Make a *piñata*, play some *mariachi* music, and remember the small Mexican army that bravely protected their country.

What do all of these things have in common?" He waited a moment and then continued. "None of them would be possible without the hundreds of amazing muscles in your body. Did you know that there are more than six hundred muscles in the human body?"
- "The ones we can control are called *voluntary muscles*. These are the muscles you use to do things like kick a ball or shake hands. The ones we can't control are called *involuntary muscles*. The heart is one example of an involuntary muscle. Now, Eva will tell you a little bit more about the kinds of muscles in the human body."
- <sup>4</sup> Eva stepped forward. "There are three main categories of muscles," she began. "Smooth, skeletal, and cardiac muscles. Smooth muscles are involuntary. Your brain and body give directions to these muscles without you thinking about it. Smooth muscles help your eyes focus. They are also found in your stomach. How many people have ever thrown-up?" she asked.

- <sup>6</sup> "Cardiac muscles are the muscles of your heart," continued Eva. "They perform one of the most important functions in your body. They contract and relax to pump blood through your entire body.

- "The last type of muscle is the skeletal muscle," Eva told her class. "These are muscles that you can control. They are attached to portions of your skeleton by tissues called *tendons*. When you want to pick up something, for example, your brain sends a message to your muscles. Tendons help the muscles move your arm and pick up the object."
- What is the best kind of exercise for your muscles?" Kwame asked. "It is aerobic exercise. It makes your heart stronger and your skeletal muscles more powerful. There are many ways to get aerobic exercise. Bike riding, hiking, playing softball, jumping rope, swimming, and roller-blading are just a few examples."

### Muscles in the Wild

How are the muscles of different animals suited to their needs?

- You probably know many of the things that you can do with the hundreds of different muscles in your body. But have you ever thought about how the muscles in an animal's body are different from yours? An animal's muscles are made to do the things that are most important for its survival.
- <sup>2</sup> Lions are hunters. They depend on their ability to hunt other animals to survive. Lions must be fast in order to catch their prey. The powerful muscles in their rear legs allow them to run at speeds of more than 30 miles per hour. They can also leap a distance of more than 35 feet. The strong muscles in their chests and front legs help them capture their prey.
- Snakes also use their muscles for hunting prey and for movement, but their muscles function in very different ways than lions' do. Because snakes do not have any limbs, they need a form of locomotion other than walking, crawling, or flying. Pound for pound, snakes have more muscles than most animals. They contract, or tighten, and then release their powerful muscles. This creates a wavelike motion down the length of the snake's body. These waves push against the ground or other objects to move the snake forward. This is just one of several ways snakes get from one place to another.

- Snakes' muscles are also equipped to allow them to swallow things that seem much too large. For example, a snake may eat an egg that is larger than the width of its body. How does the snake accomplish this amazing feat? Can you imagine eating an entire watermelon in a single gulp? The snake's strong neck muscles tighten and release to push the egg along as the snake swallows. The pressure of the muscles is so strong that it cracks the shell and allows the snake to digest the egg's contents.
- The elephant's trunk contains an enormous amount of muscle. Scientists believe that the trunk alone has more than 100,000 muscles! This is because the elephant uses its trunk much in the same way that people use their hands and fingers. Even though the trunk is large, it can perform surprisingly delicate tasks. For example, an elephant can pick up a small twig or leaf from the ground. The trunk can also be a powerful tool. An elephant can use its trunk to pick up a tree by its roots or even to lift a baby elephant.
- The specialized muscles of these animals seem pretty incredible. But the muscles in your body work exactly the way you need them to. After all, it might be fun to be able to leap a distance of 30 feet, but as a human being, there is just not much need for it.

### The Art of the Elephants

What makes a drawing or a painting a piece of art?

- <sup>1</sup> If your cat walked across something you were painting and left footprints behind, would you consider your cat an artist? What if your bird could hold a colored pencil in its beak and make marks on a piece of paper? These ideas might sound like a joke to you, but some people have been taking animal art very seriously.
- <sup>2</sup> In 1995, two Russian-American artists, Vitaly Komar and Alex Melamid, first heard about the troubled elephants of Thailand. Elephants were used for hundreds of years in Thailand's logging industry to haul timber from forests in areas where there were no roads. When the forests of Thailand began to slowly disappear, the government put a stop to logging. All of a sudden, there were many elephants who no longer had a way to make a living.
- Some elephants were abused. Others had to try to survive on their own and couldn't find enough to eat. There were once tens of thousands of elephants living in Thailand. Today, there are less than five thousand. Komar and Melamid knew that something had to be done to help the elephants. Then, they came up with an idea that would forever change the way people regarded Thai elephants.

- 4 Komar and Melamid visited elephant camps in Thailand. There they began to show the *mahouts*, or elephant trainers, how to teach the elephants to paint. At first, the mahout has to guide the elephant's trunk. The elephants became more comfortable doing this with practice—and lots of sweet snacks—and finally started to paint on their own.
- The strange idea that Komar and Melamid had to save the elephants actually began to work. They helped found several elephant art schools in Thailand and in other Asian countries. The elephants and their mahouts go there to learn about painting and to get the supplies they need. Today, people buy elephant artwork from galleries all around the world. Some are even willing to pay more than \$2,000 for the work of the elephant artists!
- Some people have compared the cheerful, brightly-colored artwork to the work of abstract painters like Jackson Pollock and Vasily Kandinsky. Other people are just happy to buy art that is so unique and original and that supports such a good cause. The next time you see a piece of colorful abstract art, find out who the artist is. You just may be surprised at what you learn!

### Jack the Dripper

Why is the work of Jackson Pollack so important in the art world?

- If someone scribbled on a piece of paper, would you consider it to be a work of art? What if the piece of paper were as big as a wall and there were layers and layers of scribbles? The paintings of artist Jackson Pollack are sometimes seen as "just scribbles." However, Pollack forced people to think about what they accepted as art. In the process, he changed painting forever.
- Pollack was the type of artist who was determined to find his own style. But during the 1930s, most critics agreed that his paintings looked a lot like work done by the artists he



- most admired: Pablo Picasso, Joan Miro, Diego Rivera, and his teacher, Thomas Hart Benton. However, the New York art dealer Peggy Guggenheim saw potential in his work and asked Pollack to create a large mural for the entrance hall to her home.
- This painting would be Jackson Pollack's breakthrough. The mural was 18 feet long, but it had no recognizable elements in it, just drips and splatters of paint. People were very intrigued and excited by what Pollack had done.
- Critics described Pollack's new paintings as more similar to a piece of music than to a realistic painting or a photograph. For instance, when you listen to a song or melody that has no words, it does not represent anything in nature. The music is simply sound for its own purpose. Pollack's abstract paintings were like music for the eyes. The colorful drips and splatters danced their way across the canvas. Even though they did not create an image, they were energetic and exciting to look at.
- In 1949, *LIFE* magazine published a series of photographs showing Pollack working in his studio. The way he painted was almost as shocking as the finished paintings. Instead of using an easel, he laid his huge canvases on the floor to make the dripping and splattering easier.
- 6 It was definitely not a clean way to paint. In fact, many of Pollack's paintings contain bits from his studio floor, like nails and coins, as well as footprints where he stepped on the canvas! His technique has been called *action painting*. This is because, unlike a traditional painter who sits at an easel, Pollack walked around and swung his arms, dripping and splattering the paint. He even earned the nickname "Jack the Dripper." Many artists saw what Pollack did and felt free to be able to create art in any way they felt inspired to.

### The Petite Picasso

- Do you know what you'd like to be when you grow up? It takes most people many years and lots of experimentation to figure this out. For the young artist Alexandra Nechita, it never really seemed to be a question. From the day she began drawing at the age of two, she was an artist.
- <sup>2</sup> Alexandra Nechita was born in Romania in 1985 and moved to California when she was still a baby. As a toddler, she loved coloring in her coloring books. Her parents were worried that she should be spending less time coloring and more time being active and playing with other children. 

## The Ringed Planet

How much do you know about one of our solar system's most fascinating planets?

- The famous astronomer Galileo was the first to see that Saturn was shaped differently than the other planets. He thought the bulges on each side were caused by two other planets sitting right next to Saturn. The Cassini-Huygens spacecraft is named after the 17th century astronomers who concluded that Saturn was actually ringed: Giovanni Cassini and Christiaan Huygens.
- The Cassini-Huygens spacecraft was launched in October of 1997, but it took seven years to reach its destination—the planet Saturn. On July 1, 2004, the Cassini orbiter began circling the sixth planet from the sun. It will continue sending information back to Earth for the next four years.
- On January 14, 2005, the Huygens probe was dropped onto Titan, one of Saturn's many moons. For about 90 minutes, it sent back data and images of the moon. People around the world were amazed to see pictures of Titan's rocky surface. Scientists were able to identify what looked like a shoreline, drainage channels, and large boulders. Every piece of information

- Although four other spacecrafts have flown by Saturn, Cassini will be the first one to stay for a while. During its four years of orbiting, Cassini will take photographs and scientific measurements that will be transmitted back to scientists on Earth. Even before it arrived at its final stop, Cassini was amazing astronomers with the best photographs ever taken of Jupiter, as well as rare views of Saturn's moon Phoebe.
- One of the trickiest parts of the mission was maneuvering the spacecraft through Saturn's famous rings. The rings are thought to be the remnants of a moon that was somehow destroyed in the past. Its many pieces still orbit the planet and create a solid-looking ring.
- The rocks and ice that form the rings vary greatly in size, from as small as dust particles to as big as a car. Trying to get Cassini-Huygens through there was a risky and complex challenge. However, the international team of scientists did it successfully.



### Kitt Peak National Observatory

*Is there an observatory located near you?* 

- The Kitt Peak National Observatory in Arizona is one of the most important astronomical research sites in the world. With 21 different telescopes aimed at the stars, Kitt Peak astronomers have made many discoveries that help us better understand the universe. For instance, research conducted at Kitt Peak has produced new information about how stars are formed. Research there has also helped find better ways to measure the incredible distances across the galaxies.
- <sup>2</sup> Kitt Peak is located 55 miles southwest of Tucson in the Quinlan Mountains that rise from the Sonoran Desert. This land is part of the Tohono O'odham Nation, the Native American people who have lived there for many centuries. Kitt Peak was originally called *Ioligam*, the Tohono O'odham word for the manzanita bush that grows there.
- In the mid-1950s, scientists started a search for the best place to put a national observatory. From more than 150 potential mountain sites, Kitt Peak was chosen as the best location. Today, Kitt Peak is just one part of the National Optical Astronomy Observatory. The NOAS also has telescopes in New Mexico, Hawaii, and Chile. These telescopes work together so that there is always the best possible view of outer space.

- <sup>4</sup> Kitt Peak National Observatory offers daily tours of its facilities, but it also has a special night program that allows anyone to come and enjoy a close-up view of the universe. The Nightly Observing Program lets visitors look through either of two powerful telescopes to see astronomical features not visible to the naked eye.
- <sup>5</sup> At Kitt Peak, you might see any of the planets. You might also see meteors and comets that pass by. If you see a thick band of light flowing across your view, that is probably the Milky Way galaxy. Galaxies are groups of millions, and even billions, of stars that are grouped together and move as one through the universe. The Milky Way is the galaxy that contains our solar system.
- Some other interesting things you might see are nebulae and clusters. Nebulae (the plural form of *nebula*) are enormous clouds of gas and dust where stars are formed. Astronomers give them descriptive names such as the *Swan Nebula* and the *Cat's Eye Nebula*. Clusters are groups of stars that are always seen together. A couple of clusters you might see are the Butterfly Cluster and the Wild Duck Cluster. While some astronomical objects are named, many astronomical objects are only referred to by numbers.



### Traveling with Only the Wind and a Sail

Do you know how a sailboat uses the wind to take the sailor where he or she wants to travel?

- Many people today are asking which energy sources are the safest and most efficient. In fact, there is one resource that creates no pollution and can be found almost anywhere, even right outside your front door—wind! Human beings have been using wind as an energy source for thousands of years. One of the main ways people have used wind is to propel boats across water, a form of transportation called *sailing*.
- Sails are large pieces of cloth suspended above the boat. They are used to catch the wind and move the boat forward. When the wind comes from behind the boat, the process is pretty simple. The boat is pushed in the same direction the wind is blowing. This is called *sailing before the wind*. But what if you don't want to go in that direction? Sailing would not be a very good way to travel if you could only move where the wind took you.
- The sail is designed to rotate so that it can be used in different ways depending on the direction the wind is blowing. When the wind comes from the side, the sail is turned so that the air moving across it creates a vacuum. Now, instead of pushing, the wind is actually pulling the boat forward. This is called *sailing off the wind*. It is similar to the way an airplane's wings pull it into the air

- 4 One problem still remains. How do you sail straight into the wind? The answer is that you cannot. When the wind is blowing from the front of the boat, the sailor must zigzag back and forth to go in that direction. First, the boat sails off to the right of the wind. Then, the sail is quickly rotated to the opposite side, and the boat sails to the left of the wind. This is called *tacking*.
- Although the sail is the most visible part of the boat, an equally important element is located beneath the water. The keel is like a fin that comes out of the bottom of the boat and keeps it moving forward. When the wind is blowing from the side, the boat naturally wants to turn and travel in the opposite direction. Extending down into the water, the knifelike shape of the keel slices through the water and holds the boat in a forward position. Both the sail and the keel are needed to get the boat to its destination.
- The next time you feel a cool breeze or a gust of wind sweeps a piece of paper from your hand, think about the power of the wind. It's strong enough to take you anywhere you'd like to travel, just as long as you have a strong sail and the knowledge to harness the power of the wind.

## Sailing Toward Victory

What is the America's Cup, and how did it get its start?

- The America's Cup is one of the oldest competitions that is still in existence today. The first race was held in 1851. A 100-foot-long American schooner, representing the New York Yacht Club, and 16 British ships competed in a race around the Isle of Wight in the English Channel. The American boat won the race. The America's Cup, named after the boat *America*, not the country, was born.
- For the next 132 years, the United States continued its winning streak during 25 challenges. This is the longest winning record in sports history. It seemed that the United States was unbeatable until Australia finally managed to win the cup in 1983. Since that time, only two other foreign countries have won the America's Cup.
- The way the competition works is that the winning country from the previous America's Cup is the defender. Yachts from around the world compete for a chance to challenge the defender. In 1970, so many countries wanted to compete against the United States that the Challenger Selection Series was begun. The winner of this series of races earns the honor of competing against the previous America's Cup winner. In 1983, this competition became known as the Louis Vuitton Cup.

- One way that the America's Cup is different from other competitions is that the winners do not keep the cup forever. Instead, the original cup that was made in London in 1848 is passed along from one winning team to the next. This tradition was almost permanently stopped in 1997. A vandal broke into the place where the cup was being held and nearly destroyed it with a sledgehammer. It took a silversmith three months of painstaking work to repair it.
- <sup>5</sup> From the beginning, the winner of the America's Cup was determined by which team was the first to win four races in a series of seven. This changed in 1995, when the winner was required to be the best in five out of nine races.
- Many other elements of the competition have changed during its long history. The location of the competition depends on the hosts, or the winners of the previous competition. The length of the legs, or sections, of the race, and the way boats are classified have also changed over time. The one element that has remained constant throughout the many America's Cup challenges is that the races are fiercely competitive. The sailors on the winning team have no doubt that they have earned the title of the most skilled and fastest sailors in the world. That is, until the next America's Cup race.

### **Busy, Busy Bees**

Did you know that bees have a complicated way of communicating with each other?

- Think of the last time you saw a bee. Perhaps it was busily gathering nectar from a flower in your garden. Maybe it was flying around a sweet drink you had at a picnic. Did you ever think about where that bee might live and what it does once it flies away? Chances are it lives a more interesting and complex life than you ever suspected.
- Today, the honey bee can be found on every continent except Antarctica. It can survive only as a member of a colony, where each bee plays a very specific role. In each honey bee colony, there are three types of bees: the queen bee, the worker bees, and the drones.



- The queen is different from the rest of the bees in a colony in several ways. She is the only bee in the colony to reproduce, so she is the mother of all the other bees in the colony. She can lay an enormous number of eggs —as many as 1,500 every day! The weight of all those eggs is about the same as the queen's entire body.
- 4 She has a smooth, curved stinger instead of a straight, barbed, or spiky, stinger like the worker bees. Worker bees die after stinging, because they cannot remove their barbed stingers. The queen bee can sting repeatedly without injuring herself.
- <sup>5</sup> Another difference between queen and worker bees is that a queen bee can live for one to three years, while a worker bee lives only an average of six weeks.
- of worker bees. A single colony may contain as many as 80,000 worker bees. They are called worker bees for a very good reason. Their job is to build and maintain the nest, gather nectar and pollen to make honey, and care for the young bees. If the hive becomes too warm for the eggs and young bees, the worker bees fan their wings to make it cooler. When the hive becomes too cool, they huddle around the eggs and young bees to warm them.
- <sup>7</sup> The third type of honey bee is called a *drone*. The drones are the male bees. They do not have stingers or tools for working. They cannot even feed themselves. Their only purpose is to mate with the queen bee to produce new worker bees.
- None of the most fascinating things about honey bees is their way of communicating. Bees are able to tell each other where to find food by doing complicated "dances." These dances can tell bees how far away food can be found and in which direction it is located. The moves they make are so clear that scientists who have studied bee communication can actually watch a dance and follow a bee's directions.

# Rock On!

How are the various types of rock climbing different from one another?

- People have always climbed mountains, either to hunt wild animals that lived there or to find good grazing for their domestic animals. Today, people mostly climb for excitement, adventure, and even competition.
- There are three basic types of climbing: alpine climbing, ice climbing, and rock climbing. The first two are done on mountains and use teams of people to get to the top. Sometimes, alpine and ice climbing can take days to complete. Rock climbers, however, are more concerned with the physical part of climbing and will find a rock face or cliff anywhere they can, even if it is indoors!
- There are two kinds of rock climbing. Free climbing is when a person uses only his or her hands and feet to ascend the cliff or rock wall. Ropes are still used as a safety precaution in case the climber slips, but the ropes cannot be used in any other way. The climber wedges his or her fingers into cracks and holes, or grabs onto rocks that stick out. Free climbers use all of their muscles to ascend the wall. To keep their hands dry, climbers apply gymnasts' chalk and wear athletic tape to ensure a firm grip. They also wear special shoes that have sticky rubber soles.
- The other type of climbing is aid climbing. In this type of climb, the person can use a variety of different tools. Ropes are still used for safety, but now they can also be used to help pull the climber up. For long climbs, there is even a sling that can be brought along so that the climber can sit and rest.
- Before a new climber tries scaling the side of a steep, rocky cliff or wall, he or she needs to practice somewhere safe. One method is called *bouldering*. Climbers find a site where large rocks are available close to the ground. They can practice their maneuvers without worrying about falling a great distance. Another great place for practicing is at an indoor rock-climbing facility.

- Rock climbing competitions are usually held at these indoor spaces as well. One kind of race is all about speed. Two identical walls are set up next to each other, and the climbers simply race to the top.
- The other type of competition is more about decision making. Each competitor is given the same amount of time to climb the same wall, and whoever gets to the highest point wins. The climber must decide which path is best to get to the top. Sometimes, the climber starts off in one direction only to find out that it leads to a dead end. The climber must then climb back down and try a different path. The competitors do not get to watch each other climb. Otherwise, they would see each other's mistakes and have an unfair advantage.

# Forehead in the Sky

Why would a person risk his or her life to climb to the top of the highest mountain on Earth?

- Today, mountain climbing and rock climbing are popular "extreme sports." Mount Everest in the Himalayan Mountains is the ultimate test of a climber's skill and courage. But Mount Everest is not just any mountain. Believed to be the highest mountain in the world, Mount Everest rises 29,035 feet into the sky. In fact, it is getting taller all the time! Scientists have discovered that due to geological forces, Mount Everest is gaining a few millimeters in height every year.
- The conditions on Mount Everest are some of the most extreme in the world. January is the coldest month on the mountain. Temperatures average about -33°F but can drop to -76°F. During the warmest month, July, temperatures still only average -2°F. In addition to frigid temperatures, the weather on Mount Everest is also often unpredictable. Massive blizzards can suddenly blow in and completely obstruct vision. In the middle of winter, gusts of wind can reach more than 170 miles per hour. These winds are considered hurricane force!
- Many people cannot understand why anyone would choose to climb a mountain in such dangerous conditions. But humans have always loved a chance to test themselves against the elements of nature. The people who choose to climb mountains love the challenge and the thrill of accomplishing such an amazing feat.
- On a historic day in 1953, Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay became the first people to reach the summit of Mount Everest. Hillary was an explorer from New Zealand, and Norgay was his Sherpa porter. The Sherpas are the mountain people of Nepal. They are often hired as guides and porters by foreign explorers. At the time of their expedition, Norgay was an experienced climber of Mount Everest, though he had never reached the summit.

- before them had tried and failed to conquer the enormous mountain. Some even lost their lives in snowstorms or avalanches. It was a combination of skill, luck, determination, and courage that allowed Hillary and Norgay to succeed where others before them had not. Both men received honors for their accomplishment. Hillary was knighted, and Norgay received the highest award a civilian, or someone not in the military, could receive.
- Since Hillary and Norgay's famous journey, many other adventurous people have made the dangerous climb up Mount Everest. More than 4,000 people have attempted to climb Mount Everest, and more than 170 have died. Something is so intriguing about Mount Everest that people are still willing to risk their lives to climb it. Maybe that's because it's the highest mountain in the world—a mountain the Nepali people call *Sagarmatha*, or *Forehead in the Sky*.





# The Race for President

How does the Electoral College work?

- You might be just old enough to remember some of the controversy that surrounded the presidential election of 2000. In one of the closest political races in United States history, more people voted for Vice-President Al Gore than Texas governor George W. Bush. How did Bush become President then? It is because he received a larger number of electoral votes.
- The person with the most votes in the race for President of the United States is not necessarily the winner. Instead, the United States has a system called the *Electoral College* in which candidates are awarded a set number of votes for each state they win. For example, the candidate who receives the most votes in Florida earns 25 electoral votes and in Nebraska earns 5. This is partly because more people live in Florida than in Nebraska.
- There are a total of 538 electoral votes available from all of the states, including three votes from the District of Columbia. To become President, the candidate must receive at least half of the electoral votes, or a minimum of 270 votes.
- In the 2000 election, Al Gore actually received 500,000 more votes than George W. Bush. However, Bush received 271 electoral votes compared to Gore's 266. It was a very close race, but the election results in Florida were even closer. With nearly 6,000,000 votes cast, the final official count put Bush ahead by only 537 votes. Because Florida's 25 electoral votes could swing the presidency either way, many people wanted to recount the votes to be confident about which man had won.

- For more than a month, people recounted votes, and the candidates and their supporters waited anxiously for the results. Finally, on December 12, 2000, the Supreme Court of the United States decided that enough recounting had been done. The accepted totals meant that George W. Bush would be President. Even though Al Gore was not happy about this decision, he conceded the election. He said that his supporters should put all of their energy into respecting the new President.
- Some people believe that the Electoral College system is not a fair way to elect our Presidents. They feel that when a candidate wins the election in a state, the votes for the other candidate do not count. The winner receives all of the electoral votes, no matter how close the race might have been.
- Supporters of the Electoral College system believe that it helps smaller, less populated states have a voice in the election. They feel that if the winner was simply the person with the most votes, candidates would campaign only in big cities and in states like California, Texas, and Florida. The Electoral College ensures that every part of the United States has a voice in an election. As the 2000 presidential election proved, even the three electoral votes available in Wyoming would have changed the final result.

- Whenever a shipwreck is discovered, there are two different ways to think about the remains. Some people value the shipwreck for its financial worth. They are explorers who have spent a lot of their own time and money searching for the wreck. When they finally locate it, they believe that the ship and its contents should be theirs. These people are usually referred to as *treasure hunters*.
- Other people, however, see shipwrecks as a valuable opportunity to study history. For them, a ship lying at the bottom of the sea is a valuable snapshot of how citizens from past cultures lived and traveled. Maritime, or marine, archaeologists are the scientists who study underwater historical sites.
- Both the treasure hunters and the archaeologists have a good point. Many shipwrecks are discovered because of the treasure hunters. They are motivated to spend personal resources on research and equipment because they might find gold, jewelry, and expensive antiques scattered across the ocean floor. After investing so much of their own money, it seems as though they have earned the right to collect the treasure.
- <sup>4</sup> On the other hand, scientists argue that shipwreck sites are more valuable as historical artifacts that can benefit everyone. By studying these sites, they hope to have a better understanding of human history. They want to prevent treasure hunters from disturbing the sites and taking away the historical artifacts. This idea seems like a valid argument as well.
- The solution to this dilemma has been for scientists and treasure hunters to compromise and even work together. Treasure hunters usually let scientists spend as much time as they need to study the wreck and its cargo. In return, scientists have provided better equipment and resources for exploration.

- One of the most important technologies for searching underwater is *sonar*. Sonar uses sound waves to "see" in the darkest depths of the ocean. Sound waves are projected through the water. When they run into something, they bounce back to receptors on the ship. The shape and size of objects underwater are determined by how long the waves take to return to the sonar equipment.
- Robots are the latest tool to be used for finding shipwrecks. Because of the intense pressure found deep underwater, it is very difficult for humans to travel far below the surface. However, robots with cameras and sonar can be sent to incredible depths. JASON Jr. was the robot used by Dr. Robert Ballard to discover the *Titanic* at a depth of about 13,000 feet!

# The Wreckage of the Belle

What would you expect to find in the wreckage of a 300-year-old ship?

- In 1686, a French ship called the *Belle* sank in Texas's Matagorda Bay. It would be more than 300 years before archaeologists were able to excavate the site. It turned out to be well worth the wait. The *Belle* held clues to historical events and information about the last journey of the famous French explorer, René-Robert Cavelier, Sieur de La Salle.
- The *Belle* was part of an expedition of four French ships that were headed for the mouth of the Mississippi River. The ships sailed far off course and landed on the coast of Texas, about 400 miles from where they had meant to go.
- <sup>3</sup> The crew and settlers faced many hardships, such as conflicts with the Native American people in the area, disease, and malnutrition. In spite of their troubles, the group settled in a place they named *Fort St. Louis*. During a winter storm, the *Belle* sank in Matagorda Bay.
- In 1995, after years and years of searching, a marine archaeologist named J. Barto Arnold finally came across the wreckage of the *Belle*. It took nearly a year for the Texas Historical Commission to excavate the site. They installed a structure called a *cofferdam* that made the work of the archaeologists much easier. The cofferdam was a large, circular piece of steel that was placed around the wreckage of the ship. Water was pumped out of the area inside the cofferdam. This allowed the archaeologists to work in a dry area instead of deep underwater.
- One of the most interesting things about the artifacts that were found on the *Belle* is that they show what kinds of materials people coming to settle a new land needed. After so many years, you might think that almost everything would have decayed, or rotted away. Luckily, the thick mud that covered the bottom of the ship helped preserve things that might have been lost forever.

- About a million artifacts were found in the wreckage. Among the items were cloth, bone, wood, the hull (or body) of the ship, three bronze cannons, thousands of glass beads, bells, and pottery.
- The was a lot of work to carefully remove all those artifacts from the ocean floor, and it will take just as much attention to preserve them. Every single item will be cleaned, identified, and preserved. Many pieces are on display in Texas museums today, but it will be a long time before archaeologists have learned everything they can from this amazing discovery!



# La Salle

Read to learn about La Salle's exploration of North America.

- When Europeans first arrived in North America, they had no idea what the land looked like or how big it was. For this reason, explorers traveled across the continent in all directions trying to map the territory and discover what resources were available. One of the most famous of these European explorers was René-Robert Cavelier, Sieur de La Salle, more simply known as "La Salle."
- <sup>2</sup> La Salle was born in France in 1643, but his desire for adventure took him west across the Atlantic Ocean. In 1666, La Salle settled in the eastern part of Canada, controlled by France at that time, and established himself as a fur trader. During his first years in North America, La Salle explored areas closer to his home, but by 1678 he was ready for a substantial journey.
- La Salle prepared his ship, called *Le Griffon*, to sail around the Great Lakes. It was very common at that time to find ships sailing the oceans, but *Le Griffon* would be the first ship to sail the Great Lakes. By the time La Salle returned, he had explored Lake Erie, Lake Huron, and Lake Michigan. He also established forts for France along the way.

- 4 La Salle's next adventure, and the one he might be best known for, was a trip down the Mississippi River. Although the river had been used for centuries by the indigenous people of the area, La Salle became the first European to travel its entire length. Aided by Native American guides, La Salle canoed south until reaching the Mississippi Delta, the area where the river empties into the Gulf of Mexico. To honor his home country, La Salle named the region *Louisiana* after King Louis XIV of France.
- In 1683, La Salle returned to France and was named viceroy of North America in recognition of his accomplishments. The next year he left France again, this time to establish a French colony at the mouth of the Mississippi River. Unfortunately, La Salle's adventure did not go as planned. Instead of arriving at the Mississippi Delta, La Salle and his crew landed at Matagorda Bay in Texas, thinking it was the western area of the delta. It was almost four years before La Salle realized his mistake.
- Hoping that his northern friends would be able to help him relocate the colony, La Salle recruited a group of men to join him on a journey to Canada. This was the one adventure La Salle never completed. Because of poor conditions during the journey north, La Salle's men mutinied and took his life. In 1687, La Salle's explorations came to an end.

# **An Unlikely Friendship**

Have you ever observed two animals of different species form a friendship?

- Have you ever heard of a friendship between a cat and mouse? An unlikely friendship developed between a domestic black cat named *Muschi*, which means *pussycat* in German, and an Asiatic shaggy black bear named *Maeuschen*, or *little mouse*. A relationship between these two creatures may seem even less likely than one between a cat and a real mouse. Yet Muschi and Maeuschen seem to live quite happily in Maeuschen's cage at the Berlin Zoo in Germany.
- No one is quite sure how the friendship first began. One day, zookeepers noticed the tiny black cat in the bear's outdoor pen. They were surprised to see how well the small cat seemed to get along with the half-ton bear. Because the two animals were living together peacefully, the zookeeper allowed the cat to stay in the bear's cage. The pair and their unusual friendship became a special attraction at the zoo.
- After several years, the time came to build Maeuschen a new, larger cage. The bear was moved into temporary housing while the new cage was constructed. Muschi was not moved with her friend, and she made her displeasure quickly known. She paced back and forth outside Maeuschen's temporary cage, crying to be let in. The zoo workers finally took pity on Muschi and allowed her to move back in with Maeuschen. The cat and bear happily cuddled together, and then went back to their normal routine of lying in the sun and sharing meals.
- Muschi isn't the only cat to have made friends with an animal more than a hundred times her size. In 1972, psychologist Francine Patterson was teaching a gorilla named Koko how to communicate using American Sign Language. Koko loved listening to books about cats and seeing pictures or photographs of cats. For the gorilla's birthday, Patterson allowed Koko to choose a kitten as a pet.

- <sup>5</sup> You might think that a kitten would be terrified of such a large animal, but All Ball (as Koko named her kitten) seemed perfectly comfortable cradled in the gorilla's enormous hands. Koko was ecstatic to have a pet of her own and treated All Ball with gentleness and tenderness.
- It seems that animals sometimes have their own ideas about who would make a good companion or friend. These ideas may come as a surprise to humans, who generally expect animals to form bonds with others of the same species. This doesn't appear to concern the animals, though, who just go about their business until the opportunity for a new, maybe very different, friend comes along.

# Cats, Cats, Cats

How many different breeds of cats can you identify?

- Have you ever had a cat for a pet? If you have, you know how rewarding their friendship can be. Cats are known for being independent creatures, but they come to rely on the affection and attention they receive from their human friends.
- <sup>2</sup> Domestic cats are similar to their wild cousins in many ways. Both types of cats have claws they can retract, or pull in, sharp senses of hearing and smell, excellent night vision, and muscular and flexible bodies.
- There is an old saying that cats have nine lives. Of course cats do not possess any more lives than any other creature, but they are very agile. Although the domestic cat is much smaller than a human being, its body contains more bones than a human being's. In addition, cats are able to use their tails for balance and to keep themselves from falling.



- You are probably familiar with the names and appearances of several different dog breeds, but did you know that there are also about 40 different breeds of cats? There are fewer purebred cats than there are dogs, and this may be one reason that the varieties of cats are not as well recognized. Some of the differences between breeds are quite subtle, and only breeders or experts would be able to identify them.
- Other differences are more obvious. For example, the Maine coon cat is very large and may weigh more than 25 pounds. That is about twice as much as an average cat weighs! The Maine coon cat also has a striped, bushy tail and very long fur. The cat received its name from the legend that it is part raccoon, which is said to explain its size and striped tail.
- Another interesting breed of cat is the Manx. The Manx has a very small stub of a tail or no tail at all. Also, its front legs are shorter than its back legs. Some people think that with its stubby tail and odd style of running it looks more like a rabbit than a cat.
- Other types of cats are prized for their beautiful coloring. The Russian blue is one breed of cat with striking coloring. The Russian blue's fur is short but very thick. It has a double coat, which means that it has a layer of soft, downy fur below the fur that is visible on the surface. The top coat has an unusual bluish-gray color that appears to be silver on the tips.
- Although it's interesting to learn about all the different varieties of cats that exist around the world, it is also important to remember how many homeless cats there are. In animal shelters all across the country, thousands and thousands of cats wait for a good home with a loving family. Even though there is something special about each variety or breed of cat, there are just as many special things about cats that are a combination of breeds. It can be even more exciting for a new owner to experience the surprise of learning the hidden characteristics of his or her feline friend.

# The Power of Cats

Keep reading to learn more about the relationship of ancient Egyptians with their cats.

- Why do people keep cats as pets? Cat owners know that cats make excellent companions. They are playful, intelligent, loving animals. Cats let their owners know they are happy by rewarding them with a loud, rumbling purr or a lick on the arm. They also have the ability to be alone for several days at a time. All these aspects of cat ownership make it easy to see why millions of people today choose to share their homes with cats.
- The ancient Egyptians, who began keeping cats as pets more than 4,000 years ago, probably appreciated the same things about cats that we do today. But the reason they first formed relationships with cats was because the wild cats were keeping animals like mice and rats away from their supplies of grain. They probably began leaving food for the wild cats to encourage them to stay nearby and control the number of rodents. Once this happened, the cats became accustomed to living among people. It's likely that they were brought into homes, tamed, and bred by the Egyptians.
- There is also evidence that the ancient Egyptians brought cats with them on hunting trips. They would have trained the cats the way that other civilizations have used dogs—to retrieve animals, like fish or birds, for their owners.
- Archaeologists have been able to learn much about cats in ancient Egypt because of clues that have been found in the tombs of Egyptians and in Egyptian artwork. Pictures that were painted on the insides of tombs often show cats as part of everyday life in Egypt. Archaeologists have even found thousands of mummified cats. In Egyptian culture, this means that cats were highly respected. Some mummified cats have even been found with mice, rats, and saucers of milk buried in their tombs!

- There have also been many statues and other sculptures found depicting cats. In fact, one of the Egyptian goddesses, known as *Bast* or *Bastet*, is often shown to have the body of a woman and the head of a cat. She was one of the best-loved goddesses in ancient Egypt, and she was thought to be the protector of women, children, and cats.
- The next time you pet a cat on the head or scratch it under the chin, remember the history of cats in ancient Egypt. And if a cat expects you to treat it a bit like royalty, maybe now you'll understand why!



# **Pyramid Power**

What secrets of life long ago do the pyramids hold?

- Although pyramid-shaped structures can be found all over the world, the most famous pyramids are located in Egypt. The remains of approximately 90 pyramid sites are scattered across the country, but the pyramids of the Giza plateau are by far the best known. Three giant stone structures tower over the desert floor and are visible for miles. But why are they there, and who built them?
- <sup>2</sup> Pyramids were used throughout ancient Egypt as extravagant tombs for pharaohs. Pharaohs ruled the kingdoms of ancient Egypt, but they were more than just ordinary kings. Ancient Egyptians believed that the pharaoh was a living god who they had to worship and obey. When the pharaoh died, it was only fitting to build such a huge monument in which to bury him.
- Because the pyramids are so old, many of them are now just piles of stones, but the pyramids at Giza are still standing tall. The largest of the three, the tallest pyramid in the world, is the Great Pyramid of Giza. It was built for the pharaoh Khufu in 2570 B.C. For nearly 4,000 years, this pyramid was the tallest building on earth. It was originally 480 feet tall, but because of erosion, it now stands at 450 feet tall. Each side is 750 feet long.

- Egyptian history, are amazed by how precisely this giant structure was built using the primitive technologies that would have been available. For example, despite how long the sides of the pyramid are, the builders were able to make each side the same length within half an inch. The pyramids' sides also face exactly north, south, east, and west.
- Originally, Egyptologists thought that it took hundreds of thousands of slaves almost 30 years to build the Great Pyramid. Today, the most accepted theory is that farmers worked on the pyramid during the times of the year when they did not need to be in their fields. It is also now believed that only about 30,000 people were needed for the construction.
- The Great Pyramid was built using giant stones that weighed as much as four tons each. The whole pyramid weighs almost eight million tons! Without cranes and trucks, how in the world did the ancient Egyptians move the stones into place? No one knows for certain, but most people believe that sleds were used to slide the stones over great distances. Scholars also think that ramps were built to move the stones up the side of the pyramid and into place. One problem with this theory is that the ramps would have needed to be almost as big as the pyramid itself.

# Wind Power: It's a Breeze

How do you think wind is used today?

- Think about the different ways that people use the wind. You can use it to fly a kite or to sail a boat. Wind is also one of our cleanest and most abundant power sources, as well as one of the oldest. Historians have found proof of windmills being used in Persia, an ancient Iranian culture, as far back as the seventh century B.C. They were first introduced to Europe during the 1100s, when armies returned from the Middle East with knowledge of harnessing wind power.
- Like a pinwheel, the blades of a windmill spin when the wind blows. The spinning blades turn wheels and gears inside the structure, which in turn run machinery or perform other tasks. The term *windmill* is commonly used to describe all of these power generators, but *wind turbine* is the more precise term. One of the original uses



- of wind power was to mill, or grind, wheat into flour. People also used windmills to pump water from deep underground when there was not a water source available above ground.
- When electricity was discovered in the late 1800s, a new use for wind turbines was found. People who lived in remote areas did not have access to the electrical power that was distributed in the cities. They attached wind turbines to equipment that would turn the energy from the spinning blades into electricity. This process allowed farmers and their families to have electric lights and radio.
- <sup>4</sup> By the 1940s, electricity was available to people in almost all areas of the United States, so windmills were rarely used. Even water pumps were run using electricity. However, during the 1970s, people started becoming concerned about the pollution that is created when coal and gas are burned to produce electricity. People also realized that these fossil fuels would not last forever. There is only a limited supply of coal and gas available.
- citizens who wanted to use cleaner, renewable energy sources rediscovered the wind. Today, there is a global movement to supply more and more of our electricity through the use of wind turbines. One windmill does not produce very much energy, so windmill "farms" are built. Dozens of windmills spin together and create a large amount of energy. The best places for windmills are those places with the most wind, like the open plains of the central United States, on the ocean, and on mountain ridges.
- <sup>6</sup> Europe is leading the way in wind power. Nearly 75% of all turbines are located there. The country that produces the most energy from wind is Germany. However, Germany uses a lot of energy, and wind only supplies about 5% of all its electrical needs. Denmark is the global leader by using wind to supply almost 20% of its energy usage.

# Make Your Own Kite

Have you ever flown a kite before?

#### **Materials You Will Need:**

one 20-inch wooden dowel rod; one 24-inch wooden dowel rod; a pencil; a ruler; a craft knife; wood glue; fishing line; a piece of heavyweight paper, at least 26 inches square (can be found at crafts stores); scissors; tape; a sewing needle; string; ribbon

#### **Optional Materials:**

stickers, paint, markers, and rubber stamps

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Ask a parent or other adult to use the craft knife to make a notch across the flat end of each dowel rod
- 2. Make a mark with a pencil 6 inches from the top of the large dowel rod and 10 inches from the top of the small dowel rod.
- 3. Place the smaller dowel rod on top of the larger one. Glue the two rods together at the places where you made a mark. Be sure that the notches at the ends of the rods are horizontal when your kite frame is lying flat on a table.
- 4. After the glue has dried, wind some fishing line around the intersection of the two rods to make sure they stay securely joined together. The fishing line should form an X at the intersection of the rods.
- 5. Now take the fishing line, which should still be attached to the X in the center of the frame, and thread it through the notch at each end of the dowel rods. Thread it through each notch a second time, and then return the fishing line to the center X. Make a few more loops around the X. Then knot the line and cut off the excess.
- 6. Place the kite frame on the piece of paper. Trace the shape of the kite, and then add two inches to the border. Cut out the larger shape. Center the frame over the paper, and then fold the edges over the frame. Tape the folded edges securely.

- 7. If you like, you may decorate your kite with the stickers, paint, markers, and stamps.
- **8.** Use the needle to make a small hole in the paper at the top and bottom of the kite. From the frame side, push a piece of fishing line through each hole and knot it. Take the rest of the fishing line (which should still be wound on the spool), and tie the loose end of it about one-third of the way down the middle piece.
- **9.** Attach a 6-foot-long piece of string to the base of the kite. This will be the kite's tail.
- **10.** Use the ribbon to tie a bow every 10 or 12 inches along the kite's tail.
- 11. Your kite is complete. All you need to do is wait for a breezy day, take your kite to the park, and see how high it can soar!

# **Ederle Amazing!**

Read on to learn more about this talented and determined woman.

- Can you imagine doing one thing for more than 14 hours without stopping? In 1926, Gertrude Ederle (*ED er lee*) became the first woman to swim across the English Channel. It took her 14 hours and 39 minutes, and she broke the men's record at that time by almost two hours.
- Before Ederle, only five people had managed to swim across the English Channel, a body of water that divides England and France. All five were men, and Ederle was determined to be the first woman to accomplish the same feat. Ederle had been a strong swimmer since she was a child. When she was only 17, she participated in the 1924 Olympics in Paris. She won two individual bronze medals and a gold medal as part of the American freestyle relay team.
- In 1925, Ederle decided that she was ready to face the challenge of swimming the Channel. Well into the race, Ederle began coughing. Her trainer, who was traveling in a small boat alongside her, thought she was in trouble and reached out to help her. As soon as he touched her, Ederle was disqualified from the race.
- A year later, Ederle again attempted to swim across the English Channel. This time, she was successful. She battled the cold temperature of the water, rough winds, and fog. She knew that she could encounter jellyfish, Portuguese manof-wars, and even sharks. The English Channel was also a very busy shipping route, and swimmers had to be sure to stay out of the path of oncoming freighters.
- In addition to these dangers, swimming for such a long period of time can become boring. In one of the boats that traveled alongside Ederle, there was a phonograph, which was an early version of the record player. Music from the records and from people singing in the boats helped keep Ederle occupied as she swam.

- The weather was especially rough during Ederle's journey across the Channel. This is one reason why her record-setting time was so amazing. Because of the rough waters, Ederle ended up having to swim 35 miles to cross the Channel, instead of the 21-mile distance she had planned. Even with the extra 14 miles, Ederle's record stood for many years. In 1950, another American female swimmer, Florence Chadwick, was finally able to beat it.
- When Gertrude Ederle returned home to the United States, a parade was held in her honor to help celebrate the victory. She met President Coolidge, and she even landed a role in a movie called *Swim*, *Girl*, *Swim*.
- <sup>8</sup> When Ederle was a child, her hearing was damaged when she had the measles. Swimming the English Channel caused more damage to her hearing, and by 1940, Ederle was deaf. Nothing stopped this determined woman, however. She settled in New York City where she taught swimming to deaf children. Ederle died in 2003 at the age of 98.

# Floating on Air

What is the oldest form of air travel? Keep reading to learn more about it.

- For most of human history, people could only dream of flying. It was not until the late 1700s that traveling through the air became a reality. In 1783, the Montgolfier brothers of France sent their first passengers, a sheep, a duck, and a rooster, aloft in a paper and silk balloon that had been filled with hot air.
- <sup>2</sup> Shortly after this event, on November 11, 1783, Pilâtre de Rozier and Marquis d'Arlandes took a ride above Paris in one of the Montgolfier brother's balloons. For half an hour, they floated high above the city and entered the history books as the first humans to fly.
- <sup>3</sup> Hot air balloons are able to fly because the heated air inside the balloon becomes lighter than the air outside. Helium and hydrogen are also used in balloons because these gases are naturally lighter than the air in earth's atmosphere.



- After it was proven that balloons could carry people, the next step was to see how far they could go. Crossing the English Channel was seen as a major test. The first attempt was by Rozier in a balloon that used both hydrogen and hot air. This was not such a good idea. Hydrogen is very flammable. Rozier's balloon caught fire, and he did not survive. Despite such an early example of hydrogen's danger, people continued to use it for many years. On May 6, 1937, the gigantic German airship *Hindenburg*, filled with hydrogen, burst into flames. This disaster finally put an end to the use of hydrogen for air travel.
- Soon after Rozier's fatal attempt, the first successful flight across the English Channel was completed. The French inventor Jean-Pierre Blanchard, accompanied by Boston physician John Jeffries, flew from England to France on January 7, 1785. Blanchard demonstrated the magic of hot air balloons all over the world, and in 1793 became the first person to fly in North America. President George Washington was present for this event, and gave Blanchard a message to carry on his flight from Pennsylvania to New Jersey. It was the first example of airmail.
- <sup>6</sup> By crossing the English Channel, Blanchard and Jeffries proved that hot air balloons could travel over long distances. However, it was still nearly two hundred years before someone crossed an ocean in a hot air balloon. In 1978, a team of three balloonists flew the *Double Eagle II* across the Atlantic Ocean. In 1981, the *Double Eagle V*, carrying two of the same pilots, crossed the Pacific.
- The next big record to be set was a nonstop flight around the world. On March 21, 1999, Bertrand Piccard and Brian Jones completed a hot air balloon trip that took them all the way around earth. Three years later, after five unsuccessful attempts, Steve Fossett became the first balloonist to fly solo around the world!

# **Moon Mystery**

What are the phases of the moon?

- On a clear night, go outside and look for the moon. Do the same thing again a week later, and the moon you see will look different. It is the same, familiar rocky sphere that has been circling Earth for millions of years, so why does it always seem to change shape?
- Sometimes, the moon is a bright disk that illuminates, or lights up, the night sky. Other times, it is just a sliver of white. Sometimes, the moon can be seen during the day. Other times, it is not visible at all. These different amounts of visibility are called the phases of the moon. They occur because the sun, the moon, and Earth are always moving.



- One thing that almost never changes, however, is that the sun illuminates one side of the moon. Because we live on the surface of Earth, the moon's appearance changes depending on how much of that illumination we can see. For example, a full moon occurs when the moon and the sun are on opposite sides of Earth and we are able to look directly at the lighted side of the moon.
- A new, or dark, moon occurs when the moon and the sun are on the same side of Earth. In this case, we are looking directly at the unlit side of the moon that is facing away from the sun and is in shadow. The other phases occur as the moon orbits Earth and we see more or less of the illuminated half. A half-moon is when the moon is to the side of Earth, and you can see equal amounts of the lit and unlit halves.
- A lunar eclipse is the only time the sun's light is prevented from reaching the moon. This occurs when the sun, the moon, and Earth are in a straight line with Earth in the middle. As the moon travels into the darkness of Earth's shadow, it seems as though all or part of it disappears.
- A solar eclipse is slightly different. It occurs when the sun, the moon, and Earth are lined up but the moon is in the middle. Although the sun is many times larger than the moon, it is also much, much farther away. This makes the sun and the moon appear to be the same size. When the moon's path goes in front of the sun, it temporarily blocks the sun and causes a solar eclipse. A solar eclipse is much rarer than a lunar eclipse.
- Although there is still some debate, many scientists believe that the moon was once part of Earth. Millions of years ago, something crashed into Earth and broke off a large section of the planet. Gravity kept this huge chunk from floating away into space, and it became our moon. One strong piece of evidence that supports this theory is that the moon is made of the same materials as Earth.

# One Giant Leap for Mankind

What do your parents and grandparents remember about July 20, 1969?

- In the early 1960s, the United States was in a race with the Soviet Union to develop new technologies. A nation's ability to travel in space was seen as the ultimate test, so President John F. Kennedy made a bold speech. He declared that the United States would land a human being on the moon by the end of the decade. On July 20, 1969, this mission was accomplished when two astronauts walked on the surface of the moon.
- NASA's Apollo space program was developed with the specific goal of landing a man on the moon. The first six Apollo missions were unmanned space flights. *Apollo 7* through *Apollo 10* were flights that carried people into orbit around Earth and the moon but did not land anywhere until they returned to Earth. By July of 1969, *Apollo 11* was ready for takeoff. It would be the first flight whose mission was to land on the moon.
- <sup>3</sup> Launched from the Kennedy Space Center in Cape Canaveral, Florida, the *Columbia* spacecraft carried astronauts Neil Armstrong, Michael Collins, and Buzz Aldrin. After orbiting Earth one-and-a-half times, *Columbia* headed for the moon and orbited it once as well. After reaching a preplanned position on the dark side of the moon, Armstrong and Aldrin entered the lunar module *Eagle* and descended to the surface.
- They were headed to an area of the moon called the *Sea of Tranquility*. However, the area where the *Eagle* was programmed to land was too rocky. Armstrong had to take control of the craft and steer it to a safer place. Because the small craft carried only a limited amount of fuel, this action worried the astronauts as well as the scientists back on Earth. Would there be enough fuel left for the *Eagle* to take off and return to the *Columbia*?
- <sup>5</sup> At least for a while, though, the excitement of having humans on the moon overshadowed

- their concerns. Neil Armstrong was first to leave the capsule. As he descended the *Eagle's* ladder, he turned on a camera so that people on Earth could watch this historic event. Watched by more than 600 million people, Armstrong stepped onto the moon and said these very famous words, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." Armstrong became the first human to set foot on another object in space, followed soon after by Aldrin.
- While they were on the moon, Armstrong and Aldrin collected soil and rock samples and left behind scientific instruments. They also planted a United States flag and took a phone call from President Richard Nixon. They left behind a plaque that said:

Here Men From Planet Earth First Set Foot Upon the Moon July 1969 A.D.

We Came In Peace for All Mankind

Everyone held their breath as the *Eagle* took off from the moon. There was just enough fuel for Armstrong and Aldrin to return to the *Columbia* where Michael Collins anxiously waited. All three astronauts returned to Earth safely and became instant heroes all over the world.

# Digging Up History

How do scientists know so much about animals that no longer exist?

- What is the oldest thing you have ever seen? Maybe it's a family photograph or piece of furniture that was passed down through the generations. It might be a tree in your town or a piece of artwork in a museum. If you've ever visited a natural history museum, then you have probably seen a fossil that might be thousands or even millions of years old. Did you ever wonder how that fossil was formed and why it was able to survive for such a long period of time?
- The word *fossil* comes from a Latin word that means to *dig*. This is because digging is necessary to uncover most fossils. Fossils are the remains of prehistoric plants and animals that have been preserved for thousands of years. They allow paleontologists and other scientists to form an idea of what the conditions on earth were like long ago.
- The soft parts of an organism, like skin or plant tissue, are not usually preserved. Fossils of the harder parts, like teeth, bones, or the skeleton of a leaf, are much more commonly found. When the remains of the plant or animal are slowly replaced by minerals over time, they become petrified. Some of the most famous examples of this type of fossil can be found in Petrified Forest National Park in eastern Arizona.
- <sup>4</sup> Under other conditions, a decomposed plant or animal may leave an imprint that fills with sand. Over time, the sand hardens and turns to stone. The stone will be a replica of the plant's or animal's remains.
- Some of the most fascinating discoveries occur when an organism has been trapped and preserved in organic material such as ice, amber, or tar. Amazing specimens like the wooly mammoth have been found frozen in Siberia, where it is so cold that portions of the ground never thaw. Paleontologists believe that the animals may have slipped into crevices between rocks and been unable to make their way out.



These are rare cases in which every part of the animal has been preserved. Scientists have even been able to determine the diets of animals based on the contents of their stomachs.

- 6 Insects and other small animals are sometimes preserved in amber. They get caught in the thick, sticky sap of certain trees and are unable to free themselves. The resin, or sap, of the trees eventually hardens and turns to amber, perfectly preserving the tiny creatures inside.
- Plants and animals can also be caught and preserved in tar, or natural asphalt. Scientists believe that when animals came to a drinking hole, they were sometimes caught in the tar that lay beneath the surface of the water. The most famous example of this can be found at the La Brea Tar Pits in Los Angeles, California. The bones and teeth of animals like saber-toothed tigers, wolves, mastodons, and horses have been found there.
- <sup>8</sup> Paleontologists have the interesting job of uncovering the mystery of life long ago. They may never have all the pieces to solve the puzzle, but each discovery brings them a little closer to understanding the history of the natural world.


# The Fossil Lady

What were Mary Anning's discoveries?

- In 1799, in Lyme Regis, Great Britain, a little girl named Mary Anning was born. Mary was close to her father, who was a cabinetmaker. In his spare time, he collected fossils from the cliffs at Lyme Regis, one of the best places in the world for fossil collecting. Sometimes, Mr. Anning would take his small daughter with him on his expeditions. It was difficult for the family when Mr. Anning died in 1810, but he left them a valuable gift—his knowledge of fossils.
- The Anning family was quite poor after the death of Mr. Anning. Both Mary and her brother did their best to contribute income. They collected fossils and were often able to sell their finds to local collectors or to tourists. One collector, Thomas Birch, came to be fond of the family. He was sympathetic to their poverty and decided to sell his own collection of fossils to help the Annings financially. The Annings were grateful for Mr. Birch's support, as it allowed them to live more comfortably.

- 4 Mary continued to have a great interest in fossils as she grew older. In 1821, she discovered the first skeleton of a Plesiosaur, which was probably her greatest contribution to science. This discovery gave Mary the respect of the scientific community. They had been hesitant to take her seriously in the past because she was young and she was a woman. After Mary's discovery of the Plesiosaur, they had no choice but to acknowledge her reputation as a serious fossilist.
- Mary Anning died in 1847 at the age of 47. Although she had been a lover and collector of fossils her entire life, she was rarely given credit for her specimens when they ended up in museums or in private collections. In many ways, the society she lived in wasn't ready for someone like Mary. In recent years, however, more books and articles have been written about this dedicated and fascinating woman. The authors know that it is not too late to have Mary Anning remembered in history as "The Fossil Lady."



# **Money Matters**

Where does money come from?

- Have you ever looked closely at a dollar bill? You might see one almost every day, but most people don't take the time to stop and examine the piece of currency that is probably more recognized than any other in the world.
- Paper money is printed at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, which is a division of the United States Treasury Department. Beginning in 1862, all U.S. currency was printed in Washington, D.C. Today, about half of our nation's currency is printed in a second location in Fort Worth, Texas. You might be surprised to learn that money is only printed in the following denominations, or amounts: \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, and \$100. Larger bills have not been printed since 1946.



- You may receive a bill that looks worn and faded. Other bills may feel new and crisp. This is because new bills are constantly being put into circulation to replace bills that are damaged or worn out. Five-dollar bills are used frequently, so they have the shortest life span. On average, a five-dollar bill lasts only about 15 months. In comparison, a 50-dollar bill may last about five years. Coins have a much longer life span than most bills and last an average of 25 years.
- <sup>4</sup> One problem that the people at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing worry about is counterfeiting. Counterfeiting occurs when people duplicate currency. As technology becomes more advanced, it becomes more of a challenge to find ways to outwit counterfeiters.
- Beginning with the 100-dollar bill in 1996, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing has been slowly redesigning and issuing new U.S. currency. The new bills make it harder to successfully copy money. Today's bills have a watermark that shows the same historical figure that appears on the bill. The watermark is visible when the bill is held up to the light.
- There is also a security thread that can be seen in bright light. In very small letters on the thread, it says *USA* and the denomination of the bill. In the 20- and 50-dollar bill, the thread also has a tiny flag imprinted on it.
- In addition, U.S. currency is printed on a special type of paper that is a blend of linen and cotton with tiny bits of red and blue thread in it. This paper can withstand a lot of use, and it is easy to recognize by touch. It is actually against the law to manufacture this type of paper without special permission!

# **Collecting Change**

What is the oldest coin in your piggybank?

- Do you collect anything? Collecting is a popular hobby with people all around the world. Some people collect baseball cards, teapots, or seashells. Others collect matchbook covers, stamps, bottles, or dolls. There are almost as many types of collections as there are collectors.
- <sup>2</sup> Coin collecting, called *numismatics*, is one of the oldest and most popular types of collecting. People enjoy learning about coins and their history. They like the challenge of finding rare or unusual coins. Some see their collections as a valuable investment. Others just enjoy the beauty and variety of their coins.
- There are many different types of coin collections. Some numismatists choose to collect foreign coins. They may focus on a particular country or a particular time period when they begin their collections. Another popular way to collect is to choose a theme and then look for coins that have pictures of the animals, people, or objects that fit into that theme. For example, a collector may search for coins with images of ships, birds, or even royalty.
- In the past few years, many children have started collecting coins because of the United States Mint's 50 State Quarters Program. In 1999, the U.S. Mint began a program in which they would produce five new state quarters every year for 10 years. Each quarter has a picture that represents something unique or special about the state. For example, New York's quarter has a picture of the Statue of Liberty, Georgia's has a picture of a peach (the state symbol), and North Carolina's has the Wright brothers' airplane.
- Some collections can become very valuable. This depends on several factors: the type of coin, the rarity of the coin, and the demand for the coin. If you owned a rare coin that few other people were interested in collecting, it would be worth much less than a rare coin that many other people would like to own.



- <sup>6</sup> Condition also plays an important role in determining a coin's worth. Serious collectors store their coins very carefully in special display cases. They handle their coins only by the edges or with special gloves. If you owned a Liberty Head nickel from 1913, which is worth about one million dollars, you would probably be willing to give it special treatment, too!
- ollection, the best thing to do is to learn a little about it first. You can find books about coin collecting for kids at the library, or you can visit the Web site of the United States Mint for tips on getting started. You'll learn how to determine the worth of various coins, properly store your collection, and keep track of what you own. And the next time you look through the spare change in your pocket or the coins in your piggybank, you might just find that you have the beginnings of a very interesting hobby!



# **River Dolphins**

Have you ever heard of pink dolphins?

- When most people think of dolphins, they imagine the gray, friendly-looking creatures that live in the ocean. Although these are the most well-known type of dolphins, more than 20 other species exist. Almost all dolphins live in the salty, warm waters of oceans around the world, but four species live in freshwater rivers. Of these four, the pink Amazon river dolphin, or *boto*, is the most unusual.
- The colors of botos vary quite a bit. Some have only a slight pinkish tint to their skin, but others are as bright and vivid as flamingos. Scientists still have not determined why the botos' skin is pink or why there is so much variation. Some theories have to do with the amount of time the dolphin is in the sun or how physically active it is. The one thing scientists do know for sure is that the young botos are bluegray in color and do not develop their pink coloring until they are adults.
- The unusual coloring of pink dolphins is not the only thing that distinguishes them from their more common cousins. Botos also have long, thin, beaklike noses that help them catch fish in hard-to-reach places. Unlike other species of dolphins, they can turn their heads 180 degrees. This is because the vertebrae, the small bones of their neck, are not fused together. This allows botos great flexibility, which is another advantage when they are maneuvering in rivers

- In the low-lying river areas of South America, the forests frequently flood during the long rainy season. The water actually becomes deep enough that botos are able to swim through the forests, using their natural flexibility to make their way in between trees! The flooded forests make a good temporary home for the pink dolphins. There is a good supply of fish, and they are protected from fishermen's nets.
- Conservation groups are worried about the future of botos in South America. People generally do not hunt the dolphins because there are many myths and legends surrounding these animals. However, the dolphins do compete with fishermen for food. Botos can become tangled in fishermen's nets and drown. There is also an increasing problem with pollution in the rivers where the dolphins live.
- <sup>6</sup> Botos are not currently an endangered species, but they are not far from becoming one. Scientists, conservationists, and concerned people are doing their best to make sure that these friendly pink creatures remain safe and protected in the warm waters of South American rivers.



# Galápagos Giants

What efforts are being made to help protect these unique reptiles?

- Imagine an animal that is naturally found only one place in the world. It may weigh as much as 600 pounds and can survive for an entire year without food or water. It can live more than 150 years—one of the longest life spans for any vertebrate, or animal with a backbone. This animal would seem almost invincible. That's why it might surprise you to learn that all 11 subspecies of Galápagos tortoises are in danger of becoming extinct.
- The Galápagos Islands lie about 600 miles from the western coast of Ecuador in the waters of the Pacific Ocean. They are so far from any landmass that many of the animals living there are found nowhere else in the world. Two kinds of giant tortoises, each with a uniquely shaped shell, are among the diverse animals found there. The saddle-backed tortoise has a longer neck and legs than the domed tortoise. It lives on the hotter, drier islands. The shell of the domed tortoise is rounder, and its limbs are shorter and thicker. It lives on the cooler, wetter islands.
- The first major threat to the giant tortoises occurred in the 18th and 19th centuries when whaling ships captured the animals to feed their crews. They discovered that the tortoises could live for long periods of time without food or water. They began capturing large numbers of tortoises to store in the ships and provide the crew with fresh meat on long trips. Scientists believe that between 100,000 and 200,000 tortoises were killed in this way.
- 4 People are no longer allowed to use the giant tortoises for meat, but another threat to their survival still exists. When travelers discovered the Galápagos Islands, they brought nonnative animals with them. Animals such as dogs, cats, rats, and goats did not live on the islands before humans introduced them. These animals eat the eggs that the giant tortoises lay and bury in the sand. Other animals feed on the same types of plants that the tortoises eat. This forces the tortoises to compete for food that was once plentiful.
- It is not too late for these enormous creatures to be saved, however. Conservationists have been busy educating people about the giant tortoise. They have also been breeding the tortoise in captivity. Once the eggs have safely hatched and the babies have grown big enough to defend themselves, they are released into the wild. These efforts do not solve the problem of protecting tortoise eggs from predators, but they do help ensure that some giant tortoises will continue to exist in the wild.

# Talking in Code

Have you ever talked to friends using a secret code?

- Before telephones came along, most people communicated over long distances by mail. However, another invention came just before the telephone that allowed long-distance messages to be sent just as quickly: the electrical telegraph. It was not able to transmit actual spoken words, but the telegraph could send coded signals along an electrical wire. These signals, called *Morse code* after one of the inventors of the telegraph, were then translated back into words at the receiving end.
- <sup>2</sup> Samuel Morse, a famous artist in the early 1800s, was also interested in electricity, one of the newest discoveries of that time. During the 1830s, Morse worked with another inventor, Alfred Vail, to develop a way of using electricity for communication.
- They devised a simple system in which electricity was used to create short and long sounds that would travel through wires. These two sounds could be grouped in different ways to symbolize letters, numbers, and punctuation marks. For instance, three short sounds, or dots, would equal the letter *s*, and three long sounds, or dashes, would equal the letter *o*. The words *Morse code* would look like this when using the dot and dash system:
  - M O R S E C O D E

- sin between, the operator at the other end would interpret the signals and translate them back into written words.
- Morse code is a versatile method of communication. Messages can be sent in Morse code using sound, light, and even radio signals. In fact, Morse code has been used for more than 160 years, longer than any other code in history. Although the military and other government agencies no longer use it, amateur radio operators still regularly communicate with Morse code. One of the main reasons is that dot and dash signals can be understood even when a signal is very weak due to interference or distance.
- Another reason is that Morse code allows people who speak different languages to communicate. Many words and phrases in Morse code are abbreviated, similar to the way you might use shorthand like *LOL* (laughing out loud) or *BTW* (by the way) when you are online. For example, *CUL* stands for "see you later" and *TU* stands for "thank you." People from many different cultures learn these codes, regardless of their native language. All of a sudden, they have a common language to talk to the world!

# **Silent Communication**

Do you know anyone who can communicate using sign language?

- Do you have a friend or a relative who is deaf? If not, maybe you have seen people who are deaf at a restaurant or a mall communicating with their hands. This form of communication is known as American Sign Language, or ASL. Precise numbers are not available, but researchers have estimated that between 100,000 and 500,000 people in North America use sign language as their primary means of communication. It is an important part of the deaf community and serves as part of the cultural identity of being deaf.
- <sup>2</sup> If you have ever watched people sign to one another, you know that it can be quite impressive to see. Their hands and fingers fly through the motions. Like listening to someone speak a foreign language, it can be intimidating to watch someone communicate using sign language. However, once you begin to learn the different elements, you notice similarities with spoken language that make it seem more familiar.
- Just like spoken language, there are different dialects of sign language. People from different regions of the country speak different dialects of ASL. In addition, there is also British Sign Language, or BSL. Although the English language is the basis for both forms of sign language, they are viewed as two separate languages. They contain as many differences as British English and American English do.
- ASL is made of units that include four basic hand forms: hand shape, hand location, hand movement, and hand orientation, or the direction in which the hand faces. A particular sign might translate as a single word, like *dog* or *cat*. Some signs might translate to a whole phrase or sentence, such as *I stared at it for a long time*. Facial expressions can also be an important part of sign language. A sign may mean something different when it is done on its own than it does when it is accompanied by raised eyebrows or a tilt of the head.

- <sup>5</sup> Fingerspelling is another element of sign language in which each letter must be spelled out using a particular gesture. It is slower than using signs, but it is often an easy way for beginners to learn some basics of sign language.
- Many hearing people know and use ASL on a daily basis to communicate with friends or family members who are deaf. If you are interested in learning how to sign, or fingerspell, the 26 letters of the alphabet, visit the Web site www.where.com/scott.net/asl/abc.html. It won't take you long to learn the letters. Then, you can say anything you'd like without uttering a single word!





# **Happy New Year!**

How does your family welcome in the New Year?

- New Year's celebrations are a little bit different all around the world. They are celebrated with different customs, traditions, and special foods. They may even be observed at different times of the year. One similarity is that they are all marked by a celebration and a symbolic welcoming of the new year while saying farewell to the old.
- In the United States, we use the Julian calendar, created by Emperor Julius Caesar. Celebrations usually begin on December 31, or New Year's Eve, and continue on into January 1, the first day of the new year.
- Probably the most famous American celebration takes place in New York City's Times Square. A large crowd gathers below the 1,070-pound crystal ball that measures six feet in diameter. At 11:59 pm. the ball is lowered. It reaches the bottom of the tower at the stroke of midnight, and the crowd erupts into cheers and exclamations of good wishes. Many people watch the ball drop on television during their own New Year's celebrations. It is common for people to count down to the new year as they watch the ball drop.
- Making New Year's resolutions is another popular American tradition. Many people see the beginning of a new year as the time to make changes or have a fresh start. New Year's resolutions can serve as promises or reminders to oneself of changes and improvements to be made over the course of the upcoming year.
- Black-eyed peas, ham, and cabbage are traditional dishes to serve on New Year's Day. They are symbols of good luck and prosperity for the coming year. People in other countries also have New Year's traditions surrounding food. For example, the Dutch often eat doughnuts to welcome in the New Year. Because doughnuts are shaped like a circle, they are thought to symbolize the completion of a cycle—the beginning of a new year and ending of the previous year.

- In Japan, people eat long soba noodles in celebration. Eating these noodles without breaking them symbolizes long life. In Spain, there is the tradition of eating 12 grapes at midnight. This marks successful grape harvests of the past and the hope for more in the future.
- One of the most colorful New Year's celebrations takes place in China and at Chinese festivals around the world. The Chinese New Year is determined by the lunar calendar, and falls between January 21 and February 19. The festival lasts about two weeks. During this time, towns are decorated with colorful lanterns and flowers. People thoroughly clean their homes to symbolize getting rid of the misfortunes of the previous year. Parades and fireworks mark the festivities, and seafood and dumplings are traditionally eaten.
