Every day he goes to the sea.






'Oh, fisherman! Put me back in the sea!' says the fish.

Go and ask the fish!'




The fisherman goes back to the sea.

'Go and ask the fish!'





'Oh! Magic fish in the sea!


Please come up and speak to me.'

'Go home!' says the fish. 'She has it.'









'Go and ask the fish!'




The fisherman goes back to the sea.

'Look,' says his wife,


'Look at this palace!

Then she starts to think...






It is morning.

'Wake up, husband!' she says.


'I know what I want. I want... the world. I want to be Emperor of all the world.'
