

'All right,' says the little red hen. And she does all the work.




The sun is warm. The wheat grows. It grows big and green.




'Look!' says the little red hen.

it now. Who can help me?'




'Who can help me?'

'All right,' says the little red hen. And she does all the work. She cuts all the wheat.






'All right,' says the little red hen. And she does all the work. She grinds the wheat into flour.

Off you go! Go away and play!'




And she eats all the bread.


