



'A real . . . real princess.'


'Let's go home,' says the King.

'Go and open the door please.'




It's a girl.

'What do you want?'


Her hair is wet.

She puts it on the bed.






'Bring twenty mattresses!' she says.

There's something in this bed!


She sits up.


