



Who is it? It's late! There's a storm! 'Harold!' says the queen. 'Go and open the door, please.'






They give the girl new clothes. They give her new shoes.

She takes a pea. A little green pea. She puts it on the bed.




'Bring twenty mattresses!' she says.

But the real princess does not sleep well.


'There's something in this bed!' she says. 'A stone! A big stone!' She sits up. She lies down. She sits up again. She cannot sleep at all!

The king and queen are very happy. Everybody is happy.


And there is the pea! For everybody to see.


