# USING THIS ACTIVITY BOOK

#### Before Reading

#### Classic Tale: Talking about the cover.

Ask the students:

How many ducks are there? (One – a mother duck.) How many ducklings are there? Four or five? Look at the big duckling. Is he beautiful? (No, he isn't. He's ugly. | He's an ugly duckling.)

#### Activity 1

Ask the students:

Look at number six. Read the word. Can you see a picture of a swan? Is it 'e'? No, they are ... two geese! Is it 'f'? No, that's a ... hen! Is it 'g'? Yes, 'g' is a swan. So the answer is six 'g'. Match the words with the pictures.

Students do activity 1. Encourage students to look for the words they do not know in the glossary on pages 22–23 of the *Classic Tale*. Check their answers.

#### While Reading

#### Activity 2 [Cassette pages 2-6]

Play the cassette while students read pages 2–6 in their Classic Tale. Let students reread pages 2–6 at their own pace. Encourage students to look for the words they do not know in the glossary on pages 22–23 of the Classic Tale. Ask students to act the play. Students without a part read the chant.

#### Activity 3 [Cassette page 7]

Play the cassette while students read page 7 in their *Classic Tale*. Let students reread page 7 at their own pace. Ask the students:

Mother duck leaves the strange egg. True or false? False—she can't leave it. So the answer is one false. At last the strange egg opens. True or false? True—at last the egg opens. So the answer is two 'true'.

Students do activity 3. Check their answers.

#### **Activity 4**

Tell the students:

Look at picture one. What does mother duck's friend say? She says, 'That egg is strange.' So the answer is one 'b'. Let students reread pages 3–7 at their own pace and do activity 4. Check their answers.

#### Activity 5 [Cassette pages 8-11]

Play the cassette while students read pages 8–11 in their *Classic Tale*. Let students reread pages 8–11 at their own pace and do activity 5. Check their answers.

#### Activity 6 [Cassette pages 12–13]

Play the cassette while students read pages 12–13 in their *Classic Tale*. Let students reread pages 12–13 at their own pace. Ask students to act the play. Students without a part read the chant.

#### Activity 7 [Cassette page 14]

Play the cassette while students read page 14 in their Classic Tale. Let students reread page 14 at their own pace. Tell the students:

So what's one down? Students do activity 15. Encourage students to look for the words they do not know in the glossary on pages 22–23 and in the story.

#### **Activity 16**

This is a reading comprehension to show whether students have understood the story and are able to answer simple questions within the language level of the story. Students do activity 16.

Then tell the students:

Reread the story and check your answers.
